Cabo to Barra de Navidad... A Xmas in Mexico

arb and I prepped feverishly on the day prior to leaving on our 3 day journey towards the Gold Coast of Mexico. Provisions were stored and mechanical items checked and rechecked. We made last minute stops and discussions with the friends we have developed in Cabo to wish them and their families a wonderful holiday. So with our ice chest block full and our visions of the next adventure looming, we were off ... the delightful mist of Cabo San Lucas memories still wafting in our heads. First stop was actually 2 miles down the beach for one last night. Our plan was that being 2-3 miles away from the main zone of Cabo, we would enjoy a great night's sleep and depart refreshed and

full of vigor early in the morning. Of course we forgot that when Cabo parties (which is mostly all the time), the entire area is part of the celebration. Our chuckles at 4 am as we listened to a mixture of Mexican rap, hip hop and electro beat versions of favourite Christmas songs were spontaneous and genuine. Sunrise and off we sailed towards the rocks of Los Frailes 3 days away.

Buoyweather predicted that we would encounter mild seas and light air so we anticipated a fairly easy couple of

nights but that was not the case. The wind piped up to a nice 25 knot breeze which tested our reefing skills and gave the autohelm a lot of time off. The real upside was we were hitting a steady 7 knots toward our destination and the Peterson was dialled into the 15 foot seas. We decided at about the 24 hour mark that we would perform the ritual cursing of this computer site as we vented our frustration

at having to ride this rocket sled at breakneck speed for such a long period of time. Our chant and rant towards darn Buoyweather could probably be heard in Cabo and as usual worked wonderfully as day 2 saw calm seas and perfect cruising conditions. This combined with a coarse change to Ipala made for the start of a perfect day. If we were to have a major problem and not survive any of our trips folks who found our log book would notice that in times of

absolute bliss we 3-4 miss hours of log entries due to the fantastic sailing, fishing and wildlife. Both Barb and I are generally such con-



sistent record keepers, we even have our Sirius on hourly shutdown so we take regular readings. Our hours on this trip have been filled with amazing sights of phosphorescent fish and dolphins at night and sailing as perfect as you see in those lottery winner commercials. Our next hurdle was going to be Cabo Corrientes or (cape of currents) prior to landing in Ipala. Our prior ventures into this region had made us a bit nonchalant about this fabled cape. Stories weaved by dockbound cruisers told tales of great terror and adversity that would pucker the orifices of seasoned fisherman, only to reveal beautiful crossings where we scratched our heads wondering "So when is it going to get tough? " This crossing of the Cape proved to be a bit more challenging than most other times at sea. The currents that converge here twist and turn with no pattern to decipher and the closest thing that I can relate to you

on this is taking a sailboat through a mogul run at your favourite ski resort. Of course, this run lasts about 5 hours and the moguls are 12 ft high. Seeing the Bay at Ipala was a welcoming sight as the days at sea, although beautiful and full of a variety of sailing events, we were ready to set anchor and relaxwe made it to the Gold Coast!

With the anchor fast and the fishing town of Tehualmixtle in front of us,

pared our snorkel gear. The commotion on the shore was too distracting not to investigate but what we really

found was that the commotion was

due to a huge fin in the water. This fin and the animal it was attached to raced through the shallows splashing and turning as schools of fish leaped from the water. Even with my eagle eyes, I could not positively identify whether it was a massive Manta Ray

thresher shark. As we stowed the snorkel gear we got the SUP 's (Stand Up Paddleboard) ready to venture towards the beach. We had a delightful surf in and wandered around the tiny town drinking in the warmth of the sun and the people. A few beer and shrimp cocktail (verses cerviche which we thought we had ordered we

really need to bone up on our Spanish) sent us back out to Impulse fully relaxed. We ended up playing with the phosphorescent fish and basically toddling around for the evening before we went down for a good night's sleep. As the night wind howled through our rigging, Barb and I congratulated ourselves on our ground tackle choice and anchoring technique as we held fast. Great restful night saw us sleeping in until 7:00 am then pulling anchor for Chamela. This day sail was incredible as we started the day out with numerous breaching whales, steady breeze and fish!! One after another and sometimes 2 at a time we were busier then crazy hauling in fish, releasing them until we got the right ones. We lost 2 monster fish due to snapping high test lines on one and running the spool out on another. After all the drama and cleaning up what looked like a scene from your favourite splatter gore movie...blood everywhere...we had filled our cooler with fish for ceviche

> and pan fry for a few meals. More whales and we were settling into anchoring at Chamela.

This place had very little writing in the cruising guides so our expectations

were such as a nice quick anchorage and off we go. Little did we know we had sailed into a little slice of heaven that paradise was named after...but you will have to wait for that story.

Messing About in Boats by Dave Atkins

ast month I mentioned that I was not as impressed with the Gulf Islands as I used to be. I was asked WHY and so I will attempt to explain why I made that remark. People and places change over time and sometimes the changes do not line up over time.

I have been a sailor since I was a teenager and with a couple of exceptions I have been a dinghy sailor and racer. In the early 1980's I got my first keel boat and we trailed it down to the Coast on three occasions, and thus started my acquaintance with the Gulf Islands. I discovered that the enjoyment of a cruise was equally shared between comfort with the boat and how it sailed and comfort with the onshore facilities and marinas. We also chartered after I changed my own boat for a smaller one. I recall a very enjoyable two week cruise in a C & C 27 traversing the gulf from north to south and back again.

In the early 1990's I qualified as a CYC cruising instructor and spent the next several summers taking new sailors out for a weeks cruise around the Islands and teaching them the 'ropes'. Those trips were enjoyable. The students were all delightful to have on board and the boats, mostly C&C35s, were a pleasure to sail.


The marinas were generally easy to deal with and there never seemed to be a lack of moorage. We did anchor out some of the time, that was part of the learning process. The cost of moorage was generally reasonable. Towards the end of my 'instructional' years I was starting to notice changes at some of the marinas. There was a trend to upgrade facilities and offer more shore-side facilities and generally, it seemed, to move 'up market'. A good example was Bedwell became Poets Cove.

By the late 90's I retired from instructing 'Cruise and Learn' but did do a few charters with friends, over the next several years. I think the big difference in satisfaction was with the boats. On a couple of occasions we were given Hunter boats and I did not

like the way they felt when sailing. It is likely a personal preference but it does affect the enjoyment of the cruise. Also the marinas seemed more crowded and expensive. The last charter we did was a bit of a disaster. The weather did not cooperate and we ended up motoring around, but I can't blame that on the Gulf Islands. The boat, a Catalina 30, didn't fit well with my wife who is shorter than average. I had sailed the Catalina before and had been pleased with it, but hadn't anticipated the discomfort of my wife and it all affects the enjoyment of a trip.

Enjoyment is such a subjective thing and the changes I have experienced over the years in the Gulf Islands have affected my enjoyment. Places have changed, for example Ladysmith used to have a welcoming comfortable marina at the head of the bay, but now it is filled with big ugly boat sheds meant for the ever increasing fleet of large powerboats, but that maybe just my bias showing!

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




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February..... New Year Resolutions..... Super Bowl.... Sweethearts.... Leap Year!
