cians, then come check it out.


The logistics will be sorted as we go such as time per set. We will start September and see what happens.

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Making Waves" is an expression we use in normal conversation when we want to refer to generally upsetting or disturbing a stable situation or "Don't make waves" if we want to keep the situation stable and undisturbed. Waves are a part of boating and they depend on the design and displacement of the hull and the speed at which it travels. We cannot go boating without making waves, but because they are such an inevitable by-product of moving the boat through the water, as boaters we have to consider the effect of our waves. I suspect that most boaters don't give their waves much thought unless they are set up to create waves for someone to ride for fun as in wake-boarding.

The waves our boat makes can affect



other people in ways that we don't consider in the normal course of events, but when you take a Safe Boating course there is a section of the course that deals with the effect of your wake and waves. There are speed-restricted areas on some narrow channels to prevent erosion of the banks. Locally the channel between Kalamalka and Woods Lakes, is a good example. People who moor their boats on the docks around the Lake have to make provision for the effect of boats going past the dock. I have heard the occasional curse shouted at a boater who goes zooming past close to the dock where there are boats moored. You wouldn't hear that of course above the sound of the engine, and in any case the havoc is behind you.

Sailboats, because of the shape of the hull and the speed at which they travel, make very little disturbance to the water, but for the same design reasons they are affected by the wakes of passing powerboats. In

light air, which is all too common on Okanagan Lake, sailors find it frustrating to be thrown about by a close passing power boat, when they are trying to nurse the small amount of wind to keep the boat sailing. I suspect that most power boaters give very little thought to the effects of their wakes other than the way it affects the skier, or other object that they are towing. Under the 'Rules of the Road' for boaters i.e. The Collision Regulations, as we usually refer to them, powerboats are to give way to sailboats and that includes the effect of the wake on the sailboat.

Next time you go out in your power-boat take the time to study the effect of the wake, not only right behind the boat but as it spreads out in a V astern. Observe how it persists and travels for long distances across the water. You never know but you might hear of an "Ogopogo" sighting as a by-product of you wake!!!

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




Marine Boat & Engine Maintenance The enjoyment of the boat includes the satisfaction of properly maintaining it. To many boaters, working on their boat is part of the fun, to say nothing of the savings in costs. All boats require maintenance to correct the gradual wear and tear, and exposure to the elements. A boater should be on the alert for signs of potential problems, and make repairs while the problems are minor. From spark plugs to bottom paint, the Marine Boat & Engine Maintenance Course covers all the basics for the DIY boater.

This course has been completely re-written. The course is divided into two parts, as follows:

Part 1

- Marine engines gasoline and diesel, inboard and outboard
- Steering systems
- Emergency repairs afloat

Part 2

- The Hull wood, fiberglass, aluminum and steel
- Painting and repairs to the hull
- Care and feeding of thru-hull fittings
- Marine electrical
- Marine plumbing
- Seasonal maintenance





We will offer the course in the Fall of 2012, commencing Tuesday, September 4 at 7:00 pm.

Buying a Boat

f you are buying a new boat in Canada, make sure it has a Hull Serial Number (HIN). If the boat has a motor or is designed to have one, make sure it also has a Canadian Compliance Notice. Manufacturers and importers must place a HIN and Canadian Compliance Notice on every boat that is or can be fitted with a motor that they sell in Canada after demonstrating that it meets the Canadian construction requirements. If you see a new boat for sale that does not have the required HIN and Canadian Compliance Notice, ask the seller to get them for you before you buy.

If you are thinking about buying a used boat, the first thing you should do is make sure that it meets the construction requirements that were in force when it was built. A good way to do this is to hire a competent marine surveyor to examine the boat, who will give you a fair opinion on the boat's current condition and will let you know what changes (if any) need to be made to bring the boat up to standard.

Remember:

A Canadian Compliance Notice

indicates that the boat met the construction requirements at the time it was built, so changes to the boat over time may mean that the Compliance Notice is no longer valid. Once you own the boat, you must make sure that it meets the construction standards for pleasure crafts (TP 1332E) when you operate it on the water — so get all the facts before you buy.

If you are buying a boat from another country, please remember that:

- ••Construction requirements for pleasure craft differ from country to country. Make sure that the boat meets the construction requirements of the *Small Vessel Regulations* or that you can modify the boat to meet these requirements before you operate it. An imported boat must meet the construction requirements that are in force on the day it is imported.
- •• The Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA) will ask you for specific documents, as well as information on the boat and the seller to confirm the sale and assess the duties and taxes on the boat. Before buying the boat, visit the CBSA online at www.cbsa.gc.ca or contact them to find out what you will need from the seller to bring the boat to Canada.
- •• If you will be towing the boat on a trailer, you should know that a trailer is considered a motor vehicle, with requirements that are different from those that apply to your boat.
