2016 Breakwater Replacement Proposal

Preamble:

Budget pricing for the replacement of the westerly floating concrete breakwater is currently \$1,827,935, without a contingency, up \$577,935 (46%) from the anticipated budget pricing of \$1,250,000 presented at the 2014 AGM and borrowings in the same amount approved by the Membership at the time.

Justifications for the change:

- The 2014 concept plan, copy attached, incorrectly assumed a previous lease line that commenced from a point further west than what exists today, the relocation of which occurred when our lease was renegotiated in 2006. The 2014 concept also did not take into account the required 5 meter set back from the lease line;
- Realigning the solid wall breakwater to the correct lease line bearing and setback allowance created
 a "pinch point" between the proposed solid wall breakwater and the southwest corner of W dock
 such as to render our boat launch useless and resulted in the loss of the ability to add the first 5 fingers
 (10 slips) on the west side of A dock;
- To eliminate the "pinch point" and maintain the viability of our boat launch the recommendation in the 2016 concept plan (copy attached) is to move W dock north by a distance of roughly 30 feet;
- Moving W dock further out however results in the loss of 6 fingers (12 slips), one off each of A and D docks and 2 off each of B and C docks and we still lose the ability to add 5 fingers (10 slips) to the west side of A dock to allow boat launch access;
- The 2016 concept envisions a considerably longer solid wall breakwater of 467 feet compared to 300
 feet in the 2014 concept to provide as much room as possible between the proposed breakwater and
 the west side of A dock to allow for the addition of as many slips as possible.
- Extending the length of the solid wall breakwater places roughly 167 feet of its length into considerably deeper water, thereby requiring deeper pilings to reach further into the lake bed (60 feet into the lake bed has been budgeted for);
- To provide the maximum number of slips the addition of AA dock (see 2016 concept) is recommended, adding 7 fingers (14 slips) of which 5 are 40 feet in length.
- The cables providing power to A dock need to be upgraded to be able supply power to the additional slips contemplated on the west side of A dock and the new AA dock. The west half of W dock and all of A dock are not trenched and will not accept the larger cables required.
- The 2016 concept includes replacement of the west half of W dock and adding a new 140 foot section A dock with trenched mains to accommodate the larger cables. The existing west half of W dock will be incorporated into AA dock and the whole of the existing A dock will be moved north 140 feet as one unit, which necessitates a northerly adjustment to the log bundle breakwater.
- Scope and budgets for the 2016 concept are based on the assumption the solid wall breakwater pilings will not exceed a depth of 60 feet into the lake bed. Test pilings need to be completed to verify depth required to have marine engineer sign off.
- No contingency has been allocated in the 2016 breakwater replacement budget pricing. It is proposed that a \$100,000 be approved and funded if necessary from the VYC line of credit (limit of \$384,000). If contingency is not required, no funds beyond the \$1,827,935 budget pricing will be spent.

Financial projection:

After application of the loan installment due May 1, 2016, our present long-term debt will have a balance owing of \$242,739.00. Monthly payments in the amount of \$4,613.00 are presently being made under this loan, of which more than \$3,800.00 is going toward principal. Since the beginning of this fiscal year to-date, a total of \$51,000.00 in initiation fees has been received from 17 new members, which amount will reduce the balance owing under our present long-term debt to just under \$200,000.00.

Notwithstanding our present long term debt will be considerably lower by the end of this calendar year, when the proposed new long term financing of \$1.8M is expected to be fully drawn, we have assumed a total long-term debt facility of \$2.0M to be re-amortized at the 5 year fixed rate of 4.0% available to us today.

The budget presented at the 2015 AGM this past October for the Vernon Yacht Club included a projection of additional income attributable to Membership dues and Moorage as a result of the creation of 32 additional slips, the same amount anticipated in the 2014 concept plan.

For comparative purposes the budget presented at the 2015 AGM is summarized below, restating only to show the impact to net income before depreciation with increase in total debt required for the 2016 concept budget pricing compared to the increase in total debt required for the 2014 concept budget pricing:

Dear Members ---- IMPORTANT DATES and NOTICES:

- April 16th Saturday is Crane Day;
- <u>ALL</u> boats and trailers must be removed from the property <u>no later</u> than Sunday April 17th, <u>no excep-</u> <u>tions</u>;
- April 20th Wednesday pruning of the trees along the east boundary and the willows on the west will occur, so make sure you boat or trailer is removed from the property by the 17th as neither the Club nor the arborist will be responsible for any damage from falling branches, etc.;
- April 25th Monday is the date for an <u>Extraordinary General Meeting</u> to approve an increase in the budget and corresponding borrowings for the breakwater replacement so please plan on attending;
- April 26 Tuesday Vernon Fire Rescue Services at 6 PM will commence hosing entire paved parking surfaces in preparation for boat show
- We have an increasingly active Club House with 400+ members; 281 mooring slips; and only 114 parking spaces on-site, please do the math when planning to come for dinner, an event or, an outing on your boat when you will be inviting guests.
- Trailers or RV's of any kind, with or without a boat and whether or not connected to a vehicle, are <u>NOT</u> permitted on the paved portion of the parking lot at any time after Spring Crane Day. During the period between Spring Crane Day and Fall Crane Day boat trailers connected to a vehicle and owned by a Member may be parked for day use on the gravel portion of the lot <u>ONLY</u> on a first come first serve basis by backing into the designated spaces. If there are no spaces available then your trailer must be removed from the property. To be fair to all, <u>NO OVERNIGHT PARKING</u> of trailers or RV's of any kind unless pre-authorized by the Fleet Captain (proof of insurance required).
- Please note; fresh water on the docks and the sanitary pump-out are both now functioning for the season with many thanks to Member Ed Kinnear.

Dear Boating Members

Re: Liability Insurance required for boat moorage

The executive recently reviewed the insurance requirements for boat moorage and realized an update was needed in order to meet the recommendations from our insurance provider for Vernon Yacht Club.

From this point forward, we require at least 2 million dollars of liability insurance for all boats. As your boat insurance expires this year, please upgrade to the 2 million liability. Don't forget to forward a copy to the office, or ask your insurance provider to do so.

Vernon Yacht Club Moorage Regulations regarding this are as follows: Boat Insurance

 Liability insurance of at least two million dollars (\$2 mil), is mandatory for the boat, the designated mooring member, all owners and all partners of any boat in the VYC marina or on VYC property. A copy of the covering page of the policy, or letter from the insurance company confirming this insurance, must be delivered to the VYC office each year by the anniversary date of the policy. Any member not in compliance may have their mooring privileges suspended or terminated and the boat required to leave the marina.

Winter Storage

 Any boat stored on Club property shall have current liability insurance of at least two million dollars(\$2 mil).

Young Entrepreneurs makes an Appearance at Vernon Boat Show

Senior Outdoor Ed Students from Nakusp Secondary School will be making their first appearance at the Vernon Boat show, selling their very own fishing lures and fire starter kits. The high school students have been successfully marketing and running this business out of the small community of Nakusp for the past four years.

The Outdoor Ed Program is a program exclusive to Nakusp that was founded by teacher and outdoor enthusiast Dorian Boswell in 2010. It focuses on hands on learning and developing survival skills such as shelter building, fire starting, hunting licenses, boating licenses and first aid training. They also get certified for Ground Search and Rescue (GSAR). The Jr. Program also includes knot tying and fly tying. "We live in such a small, rural community with such easy access to the outdoors that it just makes sense to take advantage of it." Says founder Boswell. Many of the students that take this course end up volunteering for the local Search and Rescue.

A large portion of the program focuses on entrepreneurialism. The students sell two products, one being a dummy fishing flasher used for salmon and trout. The product attaches directly to a down rigger ball and the fisherman simply attaches their line above the flasher and trolls. "One summer, I was out on the coast, and saw this fishing lure, and I thought Hey! this is great!" says Boswell. He then took the product back to the students where they redesigned and refined it. It's the only flasher on the market which will not speed up when the boat speeds up, therefore its not speed sensitive and can used with any lure or bait.

In 2013, the students got their first try at salesmanship. "The first year we ever sold the product was at the Trade X show in Abbotsford, and we made about \$2000." says past student Jacob Henschke. Since then, the students have moved on to the Vancouver International boat show, which they have attended annually since 2014, and flourished.

For this year's showing in Vancouver, the students sold an additional product : their fire starter kit. "If you're an outdoorsman, hiker, guader, these are great. They're portable and incredibly durable. They don't crumble, and they're waterproof" says Cameron Olson. The blocks, which are the main feature of the product, are sold in a watertight kit with a flint and steel, and a lighter. "It's a big hit with the kids. They love being taught how to light a flint and steel fire, and we love showing them." continues Olson. This year's show in Vancouver yielded \$19 000 for the program with combine flasher and tinder kit sales.

"We are the ones entirely responsible for running the business." says student Abby Boswell. "When we are preparing for a show, we make all the flashers by hand, plan logistics and design the booth. When we tell customers this, they are really impressed!" Students even get the chance to deal with other businessmen and women who take interest in the program. "Nakusp is such a small town and this program really gives us a chance at real world experience through a real audience with a real product." says another student, Cailan McQuair. The class is now looking at expanding their horizons and going to more shows. They attended the Kamloops Gun show on April 22nd, and are attending the Vernon boat show on April 30th-May 1st. We are also defending our business plans to Jr Dragons Den in Trail on May 7, hoping to win some funding there.

"All the money we make goes back into the program, and into next year's shows. The success of this program is really amazing. For the first time in four years, we are self-sustaining, and it really goes to show what hands on learning can do." says Boswell. "We could not do this without the community support. From grants we get from the different organizations in the

They are microscopic at birth and the size of your thumbnail at maturity, but despite their small size, invasive mussels are not wanted in the Okanagan. In fact, its downright scary to think about how many things would change if zebra or quagga mussels moved into the Okanagan Valley.

*Unprotected docks, breakwalls, boat bottoms and engine outdrives would be rapidly colonized. Boat engines would overheat due to colonies of mussels clogging cooling water inlets. Much effort would be required to scrape mussels off boat hulls.

*Walking barefoot along Okanagan beaches could also become a thing of the past if invasive mussels arrive. The sharp-edged shells of dead mussels wash ashore, creating a hazard for unprotected feet. Since mussels accumulate on the submerged portions of nearly any substrate, ladders on docks and rafts also present a risk.

*As they feed, mussels deposit feces and regurgitated food on the bottom of a lake. These substances become food for bottom-dwelling worms, scuds, insect nymphs and larvae, making those invertebrate forms more abundant. Some fish may respond to this change by increasing their benthic feeding or orienting to other prey that forages on the bottom. Also, as mussels feed, they filter plant plankton from the water. This in turn makes the water clearer. Fish that are light-sensitive may seek deeper waters to find shelter from the penetrating rays of the sun.

*As significant filter feeders, invasive mussels may increase human and wildlife exposure to organic pollutants. Research indicates that mussels can rapidly accumulate organic pollutants within their tissues to levels more than 300,000 times greater than concentrations in the environment. These contaminants can be passed up the food chain so that any fish or waterfowl consuming the mussels will also accumulate these organic pollutants. Likewise, human consumption of these same fish and waterfowl could result in further risk of exposure.

These are just some examples of how life would change in the Okanagan if invasive mussels were to arrive.

History tells us that these aquatic organisms can move with extreme ease and at an incredibly rapid pace. It's believed that zebra and quagga mussels were introduced into the Great Lakes in the late 1980s when European ships released ballast water containing the species. These mollusks were then discovered attached to the underwater surfaces of rocks, piers, and other structures in the Great Lakes region. During the next three decades, they steadily moved into Quebec, several U.S. states and now Manitoba, altogether infesting close to 700 North American lakes. Species Society (OASISS) has partnered with the Okanagan Basin Water Board to encourage boaters and other water recreation users to "Clean, Drain, Dry" boats and other equipment before moving between lakes. These proactive steps can prevent the spread of invasive mussels and halt the spread of other invasive animals and plants that may be lurking in our lakes.

At this time there are no known methods for eliminating invasive mussels without severely damaging the ecosystem of the water body in which they have been found. The public's help in preventing the spread of these highly invasive species is essential. Report mussel-affected boats or equipment to the B.C. IT'S ELEMENTARY

Crime in London appeared to be taking a vacation, and Sherlock Holmes found himself on opening lead at the Baker Street Bridge Club:

Let's eavesdrop on the post-mortem in Holmes' 221B bachelor quarters. *Watson:* Dash it, Holmes, why not lead the unbid suit? I must have Hearts. *Holmes:* Indeed, dear chap, you had four, but so did declarer.

Watson: We know that now.

Holmes: And I knew it before I made my lead.

Watson: An Englishman doesn't peek.

Holmes: No, it was the curious matter of your bidding.

Watson: But I didn't bid.

Holmes: Yes, that was most curious. My 6-count and the opponents' bidding told me that you had a decent hand. And yet you did not overcall 1♥. Clearly you had less than 5 Hearts. The auction also told me that West had less than four Hearts and East less than 5. Thus, the Hearts were 2-3-4-4 around the table. Watson: Very clever. I suppose you also knew that West had three Clubs.

Holmes: Yes, Watson.

Watson: You did know?

Holmes: It seemed most likely. I had five and East had at least two.

Watson: He did?

Holmes: If he was 3=4=5=1 he would raise Spades. With 2=4=6=1 he would rebid Diamonds. Ergo, he had at least two Clubs.

Watson: So, if East had two Clubs and West had four then I would have had just two. With that I would no doubt make a Takeout Double of 1. Holmes: By George, I think he's got it!

Yes, of course, Holmes did not lead the unbid Hearts, he led through West's Club suit. But how on earth did he know to lead the *Queen*, the only card in his hand which beats the contract? That's a story for another day.
