Commodore's Report Tim Amy



Four months

into the term and your volunteer executive members have been busy with Club issues as well as managing their own busy lives. "If you want get things done, ask a busy person."

Past Commodore Jim Caldwell gave up his career as a senior Captain with Air Canada to serve the Club. Vice Commodore Steve Bertram, while marketing properties 24/7 via Remax Realty, has been identifying ways to increase positive public awareness of the Club and is with Dave Atkins and Allen Dubeski working towards a meeting with members to discuss Long Term Planning for the Club. Rear Commodore Lawrence Johnson, busy running ADC, his own building and development corporation, has ordered a new sewage pump out for the dock, funding shared by the Club and City of Vernon. Lawrence has also consulted with Burton Marine for the rebuild/ adjustments to the west, north and east breakwaters. work now underway. This will be achieved well below budget. Lawrence has also obtained a sound technicians recommendations for dampening the painful echo chamber acoustics of the lounge. Fleet Captain Bob Montguire and moorage committee Roger Price and Ken Smith spend hours each week on a variety of VYC issues and are now assigning moorage for the year, dealing with a myriad of issues related to low water, wait list etc. Staff Captain Rick Reichelt, while very busy running his own business at the Blue Heron Pub, has reviewed Club bar prices and inventory, produced a revised contract for public rental of the lounge, and is organizing the All Club Invasion for March 20, 2010 and will next be busy organizing the Commodores spring ball. Treasurer Gary Pearson, in real life is CEO, Natures Formula Health Products, developing this corporate enterprise based in Kelowna. He has continued the ongoing task of refining the Clubs financial records and has established a finance committee to advise the executive.

Secretary Terri McLennan, is Business Operations Manager for Myer Sound in Vernon and does an excellent job of producing minutes of Executive meetings, making sense of the discussions and summarizing the minutes for membership quick reading in the newsletter. House and yard director, Mike Thomas, while frequently on the road to meet his own business obligations, is adjusting well to his new role of keeping the Club house functioning and is rounding up a coalition of the willing to plan an updating of the club interior. Director for docks, Dan Irvine, while busy selling property one yard at a time via Remax and managing his own rental management company, has monitored the use of hydro by boats wintering in the moorage and is now planning the upcoming boat show. This involves recruiting and organizing many volunteers, recruiting the many businesses to bring displays and the many other details. Call Dan to volunteer. Director Dean Myrfield, with his hands full as co-owner of Central Tarp and Awning and EZ Snap Fastening Products, is refurbishing the clubs street signage and assisting Ron Paziuk with the Clubs mooring buoys. Membership Director Jerry Spelchan, managing his own business and investment interests, has been actively recruiting new members, taking the time to talk with each of them and organizing new members evenings. Director Allen Dubeski, Certified Financial Planner with Investors Group, is recruiting paid ads from local businesses to help support the clubs news letter. By-laws Director Dave Atkins, a past Commodore, involved in many community organizations, advises on procedural issues. And all are having fun as VYC Directors. Ask them.

And in late breaking news, Executive members have met with the Clubs banker. Vantage One and based on recent cost estimates and the Clubs cash flow, Vantage One is looking favourably upon extending financing to complete Phase II of the dock renewal and expansion during February-April 2010. Briefly, converting B dock to concrete and extending it level with D and E docks and using the best wood remains of B dock to temporarily extend C dock level with D and E Dock, will obtain 32 additional slips. The additional revenue from 32 additional boats will largely service the cost of this expansion phase. A business plan will be developed for presentation at 2010 AGM with details provided to members during the next few months. Tim Amy

working on getting a new pump-out for the club. It is on the hi-way now and should be in Vernon and ready to install by the end of next week. Once we have it here I can schedule the installation.

We have also been working on the repairs of the breakwater. We have employed the services of Burton Marine to do the repairs on the East, North and West breakwaters.. This work will be complete by the middle of April and will solve the problems we have

had with the East breakwater and upgrade both the North and East breakwaters and will come in substantially lower than allocated in the annual budget.

Also the repairs to the electrical wiring in the club required by the fire Marshall have been completed as well as a few upgrades needed to accommodate electrical code. As always, the Security Team is the pointy end in providing surveillance at the Club, however as the



Messing About in Boats by Dave Atkins


As the weather warms up most of us start to think about getting back on the water again, probably in the same familiar boat as last year, but maybe, and with a little more excitement we have a new boat to play with. Of course we all have our Pleasure Craft Operators card, it became mandatory last year, and so we all know the Rules of the Road or as they are more correctly known, Regulations for Avoiding Collisions at Sea.

There are two kinds of boats on the water as defined by the regulations. They are "Give way Vessels" and "Stand on vessels" each have obligations under the rules and the rules define which is which. There is NO RIGHT OF WAY in the rules. A "Give way Vessel" has to alter course and or speed to avoid a collision.

A "Stand on Vessel" has to maintain course and speed so that the other vessel may be able to judge the course changes that are necessary to avoid the collision.

So the next problem is deciding whether you are a "Stand on" vessel or a "Give way" vessel. There are some neat diagrams in the Safe

Boating Book but it is easier to make up your mind right now rather than look it up in the book. "Where is that



##**! book anyway." For Power boats meeting at an angle remember this simple rhyme. IF TO STARBOARD (RIGHT) RED APPEARS IT IS YOUR DUTY TO KEEP CLEAR" (say that to yourself about a dozen times a day till it is imbedded in your memory) In real terms it means that if another boat is crossing your path from right to left you have to change course or speed to avoid a collision. The other boat, which has a crossing boat on its left side has to maintain course and speed.

Of course if the other boat does not give way you have to do your best to avoid a collision. When meeting head-on it is normal to change course to starboard (right) to pass along side the other vessel. If overtaking another vessel you can go either side but give plenty of clearance and sound the horn (briefly) to let the other vessel know that you are there.

Sailboats come under the same regulations but they have there own definition of "Give Way" and "Stand On" vessels. When boats are sailing to windward to the wind) and on opposite

(into the wind) and on opposite tacks, then the vessel with the wind on the port side gives way to the vessel with the wind on the starboard side. Port Gives Way to Starboard. If The boats are on the same tack, that is they have the main sail out on the same side, then the wind ward boat gives way to the leeward boat. Simple really.

There should not be collisions out on the water, they are costly and dangerous. Lets make sure it doesn't happen to us!!



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

Twenty First Annual VYC Boat and Leisure Show

The Canadian Power and Sail Squadron will allow boaters to take the course for the mandatory Pleasure Craft Operators Card. This card has been mandatory since last fall. Captain Rick Reichelt will be, with the help of our stalwart regular crew, organizing the second most important aspect of the show, food and beer. These are but two of many areas that need volunteer participation to make the boat show a success. Most volunteer shifts are only a few hours out of the weekend. VYC will once again host an information tent and staff will be needed to sell apparel and distribute yacht club information. Site set up takes place Friday 23rd April and a crew is needed to set up tents and organize the site for the weekend.

Winter Power

Well we are drawing near the end of the October through March winter power billing period. The individual bills have been calculated and mailed out and some feedback has been offered. Individual members I have talked to agree with the process even when surprised by the amount of their bill. This process had a couple of objectives and one of them has been realized - to apportion the winter power bill according to usage. The second equally important objective was to make members aware of just how much power was being consumed in their efforts to keep the frost out of their boats. The latter of these I feel will lead to a lower power bill next year and significantly lower the environmental footprint of our club. As a matter of general interest to readers it was illuminating to say the least, no pun intended, just how expensive producing electricity with a 120 volt heater can be. Consider the standard 1200 watt household space heater for a minute. Dividing the wattage by 1000 will get you to the kilowatts that form the basis of BC Hydro's

calculations. 1.2 kilowatts for one hour multiplied by 24 hours equals 28.8 kwh per day. BC Hydro's current pricing scheme is .0769 dollars per kwh. Apply that and you come up with a usage charge of \$2.21/day for that little heater. Add your taxes to that and multiply it by the number of days in your bill and voila, big dough. Most heaters used in the boats this winter had factory minimum of around 50-60 degrees F so they didn't get a chance to shut off. If you are considering winter power for your boat next year it would be worthwhile to research a heater with a thermostat appropriate to the application. I will be researching this myself over the summer and hope to offer some recommendations on models that will do the job.

17 April VYC Spring Cleanup and Maintenance Party

OK OK maybe party is a bit of a stretch but every one of these I have attended in my few short years as a member has been a very worthwhile day. Worthwhile in terms of keeping our maintenance costs (read your fees) down and just as worthwhile in meeting and getting to know a few members both recent and long standing. My own to-do list will primarily revolve around the marina and it's systems. (Water and electricity among others) Key among these is the annual tightening of the nuts ceremony. Our whole marina system is held together by long bolts and nuts, dozens of them. If it floats it moves and if it moves it requires maintenance and if it ain't volunteer maintenance it's paid for maintenance if ya catch my drift. You can get to know how the yacht basin functions, meet some other members and heck there's even a free lunch. Until then if you have any comments on any of the above or want to be added to a specific list for the boat show or cleanup... dan@danirvine.ca Dan

e have all seen them, those pumpkin colored, double tire buoys with a white PRIV stenciled on the side. They are scattered about our favorite anchorages and some even have taken up residence in the west lot at VYC. So what's the deal; is there a plan in place or do those pumpkins have a mind of their own?

You may have heard that a revitalization of the Mooring Buoys was approved by the membership about three years ago and that is a true fact. The first action taken was to strike a committee to determine the legal rights of ownership and rights in regard to deployment. It was determined that VYC became owners of some 40 mooring buoys when the disbanding "Okanagan Safe Boating Society" transferred

the Buoys along with some monies to VYC in the late 90's. For a number of years the Buoys were serviced by volunteer club members but by 2005 the condition of the Buoy's mooring chains had deteriorated to a point where it was necessary to enter a full revitalization project.

With the enthusiastic efforts of many VYC members all the buoys from Agate Bay north, 38 in total, were brought ashore for servicing, upgrading of hardware and new markings. So now we are secure in knowing that the Buoys are as serviceable as when they were new and that they are in full compliance with "Transport Canada regulations" for "private buoy " markings.

What's taking so long to get them back on station you might wonder? In one word: MONEY. You may have read on the Kelowna Yacht Clubs web page that they have spent 40 thousand dollars over the past 3 years on their mooring buoys. VYC has spent less then 6 thousand to date on our program and with this year's funding we should complete the project for around 8 thousand dollars and we have more mooring buoys.

So now you might remark; we have spent a fair amount of money and a lot of volunteer effort and I can't find a free mooring buoy when I want one. If they belong to

VYC then why do we let the public use them? Because we're good neighbors'; that's why. However using VYC mooring buoys comes with conditions and misuse could result in legal action being taken against violators. The conditions for use are outlined on plaques secured to each buoy and on posters which are posted at various boat launches.

OK your saying to yourself, I can read but it seems that not everyone else can. What do I have to do: read the rules for them? Well maybe you should or at least let them know that they are secured to private property. That's what the PRIV on the side means. Private Mooring. You should also be comforted in knowing that because other Yacht Clubs on the lake are upgrading their mooring buoys the public through exposure will be better versed in using private mooring buoys.

In the mean time remember that we have the lake to ourselves for at least 10 months of the year.......





Sunday racing will continue up to and including Sunday 18th April, after which we will switch to Wednesday evening for the Spring series.
