- Increasing usage of the Club house for both Club events and rented for private functions.







CPS Courses - What's on the Horizon?



Our Seamanship Course (formerly Piloting) is the second course in our series of Navigation Courses. It will run for approximately 12 weeks (Tuesday evenings), commencing in late January. This course continues from where our Boating Course finished, and covers all aspects of boating and seamanship, as well as extends the concepts of marine navigation and chart plotting. All manuals, instruction and exams are included in this great value. Prerequisite: Boating Course or equivalent knowledge.



To operate a marine VHF radio, you are required to have the Restricted Operators Certificate (Maritime) [ROC(M)]. It is the law! The Maritime Radio course teaches emergency radio procedures, as well as everyday operating techniques. 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Messing About in Boats by Dave Atkins

Now that you have spent all that time and money getting ready to sail by yourself, it is time to develop some good procedures. However this may have to wait till the weather warms up next year so file this away for the spring, or you can do dry land simulations just to keep in touch! Firstly you need to have some basic sailing experience, I don't recommend single handing as a way to learn how to sail, only for the desperate and very brave or foolish. You need a knowledge of how the boat works and behaves out on the water.

To start with you have to get the sails hoisted starting with the Main sail. You motored out of the marina so now turn the boat into the wind, making sure that you have good clearance around you. Throttle back so that the boat is moving

slowly into the wind and then use your tiller tamer to secure the tiller. While you reach for the main halyard and start hoisting the sail you may need to correct the steering a little, and this can often be done with your legs against the tiller, because your hands are busy with the main halyard. If the boat drifts off course very much you

may not be able to get the main fully hoisted.

Don't force it, get the boat pointing back into the wind. Once the main is up you can bear

away a little and start sailing close hauled. At this point I usually turn off the engine and tilt it up, the boat is moving slowly and is not heeled very much so it is easier to deal with the motor then rather than later when you have two sails up and are travelling faster.

Now the boat is moving under control it is time to raise the Jib or head sail. If you are close hauled, i.e. pointing about 45 degrees to the real wind it is easier to raise the jib than if you are stalled head to wind. The sail will clear out to the lee side of the boat and is less likely to foul, and by hauling in the jib sheet you can have it trimmed and pulling quickly. Back off the tension on the tiller tamer and start steering by hand. Now you are

> sailing under control and you have time to look around and decide which way you are going to proceed. Tidy up the cockpit and coil as many of the lines as you can otherwise you will have a mess on the cockpit sole and you may not be able to grab the right sheet when you

come-about.

Tacking the boat single handed can be classed as multi-tasking and you need a procedure unless you are sailing a cat boat (just a main sail). Someone described a Nonsuch as a gentleman's sail boat as you could tack without having to put your drink down.

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


