Bob Montguire orchestrated a smoothly run sail past with OK Landing Volunteer fireboat creating the water spray backdrop. A wind shift resulted in the water cannon spraying the reviewing vessel, dousing the powder and causing a delay in firing Jim Wilkins gunpowder cannon. The ensuing several misfires and delay caused the line of fast approaching Sail Past vessels to take evasive action to avoid running over the vessel ahead, mayhem smoothly avoided thanks to expert seamanship of the VYC skippers helming the 28 vessels. Another story for the grandchildren.

Concrete proposals for the much needed next phase of dock renewal and expansion are being worked up and will be presented to members this summer. Given its poor condition and that some of it is already concrete, B dock is identified as the priority and best bang for the \$\$. Extending it level with D dock and using part of it to extend C dock with temporary wood from B dock will provide an additional 32 slips. The additional income will service the cost. If later this year members vote to proceed, this next phase can be completed early in 2011.

It bears repeating; VYC is a club, a cooperative, not a corporate venture. Some from the corporate world shiver at the mention of co-op, imaging the grey horrors of socialism. Perhaps VYC embodies the best of both worlds; the drive and creativity of ethical and disciplined entrepreneurialism directed towards achieving the common good.

Only 125 shopping days till Xmas, so get out on the water, though not all at once please.







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seems inevitable that when you have more than one boat out on the Lake there will be boating accidents, and even if there was only one boat out there, there could be a boating emergency. In fact on summer days there are very many boats out on the Lake and so one should be prepared for an accident or an emergency. Accidents generally are considered to be collisions with other boats, the shore or some other solid object. How can that happen, you ask? One would expect boat drivers to be cautious and pay attention, but obviously that doesn't happen all the time. If people can crash their cars on the roads where the limits are clearly defined, how much easier is it for boats to crash when there is no white line or traffic signs, or run out of space and hit the solid limits to the water patch. The real answer is for the boat driver to pay 100%

attention to the task at hand, driving the boat. Being in command of a boat has some legal implications as well as social obligations. The Law will hold the driver of the boat liable for any injury or damage caused by the boat. Therefore the driver needs to pay attention to where the boat is headed and to all the other boats in the area and know where they are headed. Last month I outlined the basic rules of the Road and that is just the beginning! One has to learn to estimate speed in real terms and how that will affect the situation as it develops, this takes practice. The skier you are towing is the responsibility of the spotter, the driver should not be looking back to see whats happening astern. The boat driver must be looking ahead and to the sides and constantly scanning the water ahead. How else are you going to be able to make good judgments and protect your safety.

Emergencies, by definition are unexpected and often occur quite suddenly. This makes them difficult to deal with. The two greatest detriments to dealing with emergencies are

Panic and Fear. These are both natural reactions but they immobilize the brain and often the body as well. One cannot deal with an emergency if you are in a state of panic or fear. One has to develop a state of mind called "conscious calm" that is the brain must take control of the body and not the other way around. Then you can think your way through the problem. The solution is knowledge and self control. You have to be prepared for the unexpected and that can only be done by careful study of the possibilities before hand and familiarity with the boat and all its equipment. It is no good wondering how the fire extinguisher works after the engine room explosion. Where did you stow those plugs to stop the water coming in through the broken sea cock?

Running a boat of any type carries responsibilities. Preparation starts long before you leave the dock and it should be an on-going process. You should not ever reach the point where you take it for granted.


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

Your Slip Is Showing

Actually "show me your slip" would be more to the point for this segment. As more boats go into the water for the season I am hearing about some slips that need some maintenance attention. While these concerns are primarily related to the older B and C docks this brings me a good opportunity to address the matter of slip maintenance in general.

VYC is a volunteer run entity so it follows that most maintenance and repair items are addressed by members volunteering. If you have ever attended an executive meeting or an annual general meeting you know that one of the most important tools in the clubs toolbox is the pencil sharpener. It takes a sharp pencil to keep our costs down so members volunteering to maintain the club in general, and their own slips in particular, is a vital part of the operation.

I am exploring the idea of a Dock Captain for each dock that can coordinate activities specific to that dock and will be seeking feedback from members and my fellow directors in that regard. In the meantime though there are some pressing maintenance items that you can help with.

If your slip is on B or C docks you will be receiving shortly an email AND a phone call advising that you should be inspecting your slip for any shortcomings. A preliminary walk of the remaining wooden sections of our marina revealed some simple general carpentry items that need attention. Of course you don't have to wait for the email to do this and I won't be waiting to hear from you to start planning a work party to fix what needs fixing. Materials will be on hand, tools will be available, and help with bigger jobs will be provided by our more experienced volunteer members.

That's capital "V" volunteer members folks. If you don't Volunteer then another Volunteer will need to Volunteer to carry out your slip maintenance.

As someone who spent 9 years "anchored out", I know the value of being able to pull into a secure berth as well as anyone. Many of you, I am sure, have had experience with the always entertaining Paddlewheel Park Suppertime Boat Ramp Rodeo Hour and also know the value of pulling in, tying up and unloading your coolers etc into a dock cart. The common denominator in an easy end to any boating day is a secure and well maintained slip. It allows you to sleep nights knowing your boat is safe and makes the start to your next boating day "trailer free". It's worth the work it takes to keep it in good shape.

Don't let a lack of experience or tools hold you back. Just show up. This is an opportunity to see what your boat is actually tied to, how the cleats are attached, and generally become more familiar with the dock part of your boating investment. All specific slip repair or maintenance advisories can be emailed to me, <u>dan@danirvine.ca</u>

I am pencilling in <u>Saturday the 29th</u> of <u>May</u> to address B and C dock repairs. This gives everyone who is on these docks time to assess their fingers for any repairs that are needed. Watch your inbox and voicemail for details.

As always I look forward to hearing from you with any concerns or comments you have regarding the "On The Waterfront" components of VYC infrastructure.

Here are five ways you can reduce risk when you are boating:


1. Wear your lifejackets or PFDs (approved personal flotation device)



.On April 21,

it

was Avesha's turn to suffer the wrath of Ogopogo. The winds, according to the weather office, were a respectable 9 km, the weather was warm and it was Avesha's shakedown cruise. The skipper. Don Craske, was allowed to helm and the main sheet was controlled by the Admiral. Carol Craske. Our able crew consisted of Ed Manual and Maureen Soichuk. We sailed to the windward mark and started the run to D mark. As we rounded D mark into the wind and winched in the genoa sheet, we heard a



loud bang and then the foresail slowly sunk to the deck. We all looked up to find half our mast bent over and dangling. Luckily no one was hurt and it appears the only damage was to the mast and rigging. Poor Ayesha - she will be out for the season, we think. Next year we will make that sacrifice to Ogopogo before we go out on the race course.
