On another note





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Messing About in Boats by Dave Atkins

Last month I was talking about reading the weather when out on the water, and that is a good skill to develop, but even the experts can get caught out on occasion and then it becomes a case for survival skills. What works for you will depend upon several variables, such as the kind of boat you are in, how far from a sheltered shore or shore of any kind, how many people are in the boat and their temperaments. What kind of weather emergency is it? Is it wind or waves, rain or thunder storm etc?

Some precautions can be taken before leaving the dock. Don't overload the boat!! It sounds obvious, but do you know how many passengers are approved by Canada Coast guard? Have you looked at the approval plate lately, are you prepared to leave one or two of your friends ashore if you are over the approved capacity? All passengers are required to have seats in smaller boats, so no sitting on the foredeck, etc. Larger sailboats with ballast keels and thus more stability,

are not so restricted about the accommodation for passengers, and it is often required to go on deck to manage sails.

On the Lake the most common problem is wind and with few exceptions, such as micro-bursts, which are rare, there are warning signs that the wind will change or increase. Watching the scenery and other boaters is fine but you also need to watch the sky and the shore lines for weather indicators. Wind will bring waves and maybe rain. Waves on Okanagan Lake cannot get very big because of the size of the Lake and the short distances involved, however if you are out in a small boat the waves will look much bigger than they do from shore. Smaller boats such as run-abouts should slow down and try to head into the waves. Planing speeds into waves might be a thrill but it can damage the boat and also the wave can push you sideways so that you are traveling parallel to the waves at high speed, a very dangerous and unstable position to be in. It is not safe to run down wind in breaking waves as you run the risk of being "pooped", that is when waves break over the stern and with outboard powered boats particularly, that can result in swamping the vessel. You may think that following this advice will not get you home, but somewhere else along the shore; be

patient, it is better to get ashore somewhere rather than sink heading "home"

Sailing boats have somewhat different problems. The wind is their engine, but too much of it can turn the boat on its side and capsize it. Most sailboats will ride the waves well, their hull shape is built to do that, so wind is the main danger. If you think you are being over powered, shorten sail NOW, don't wait to see if it will get stronger. You don't want to fight the boat when its getting out of control. You should know how to "reef" the sails and have the gear set up ready to go, its no good trying to figure it out in the middle of the storm. If you are going to use only one sail, use the main, the jib alone can more easily get you into trouble in high winds. Wear your PFD on deck.

High winds may well be exciting when out on the water, but they can also be very dangerous as well. Not many boating accidents happen in calm weather. Be prepared, learn how to watch the weather. Learn how to control your boat in bad weather, be prepared and don't just say "Well that would never happen to me." It does happen to some people every year, make sure you're not one of them.

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SAILING IN CUBA

Back in November, VYC received a message from the Hemingway Yacht Club in Cuba, welcoming visits from our members.

While I was in Cuba in December, I visited that Club, on the outskirts of Havana. I met the Commodore (who is also President of the Group that owns most of the marinas in Cuba). With my son Adam interpreting I heard the story of the Club history, dating from 1884, and its current unique status as a private venture. I came away with a Club burgee, and a draft reciprocal membership agreement which our executive has since completed.

Our stay in Cuba was mostly in private homes, and we heard uncensored reports of life in the Island. We travelled by bus and visited the infamous Bay of Pigs, site of Kennedy's disastrous attempt at invasion; it now houses an unimpressive museum.



The only shell fragments we found on the beach were of mollusk origin.

Now that Fidel Castro has stepped down as

President, his brother Raoul (a former soldier) is taking the first tentative steps towards a market economy. People are being encouraged to leave the cities and return to farm the abandoned sugar

plantations, to reduce reliance on imported food; we visited one of these, now a tourist destination, and climbed a 120ft. "slave observation tower".

Elsewhere half a million government employees are being laid off, and being allowed to open small businesses. A large Venezuelan oil refinery is under construction.

We found the people very friendly, the streets safe and tourist dollars most welcome (as long as they are not US currency!). I would recommend a visit before McDonald's gets there Perhaps in Obama's

second term?

Even though Spring is taking its time to come around the corner, we decided it was time to launch our boat at Paddlewheel Park and proceed over to our new slip. As I had managed quite nicely to get Wind Dancer into slips last year in all kinds of weather both single handed and with crew, I had no worries about doing it again. 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
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On the Water Front

The date for our 10th annual Charity Regatta for the United Way is quickly approaching (**June 3rd, 4th & 5th**) and though I had hoped to be further along with getting exposure for this critical event it just hasn't happened till now. The Charity Regatta is an incredible opportunity for ALL members of our Club to demonstrate to the whole of the community that we care deeply about the community in which we live and the well being of those less fortunate, that we are not the private, exclusive Club that some of the public seem to see us as.

For those not familiar with this event, the Regatta was started 10 years ago by Dave Ellis, one of our very avid sailors, where sailboats from all Clubs on the lake are invited to participate in our Charity Regatta. The Skippers pay a minimum cost of \$200 to enter their boat, themselves and up to three crew but, it is also then incumbent for ALL crew concerned to raise as many pledges and donations for the local office of the United Way with all proceeds raised from whichever community being distributed back into that community in which it was raised.

One fact I learned recently that blew me away is that the Vernon Yacht Club's annual Charity Regatta has been the largest single fund raiser for the local chapter of the United Way with more than \$275.000 raised over the past 9 years, truly an astonishing accomplishment! Last year almost \$23,000 was raised by the 32 boats that participated in the Regatta, which works out to more than \$700 per boat.

With the average boat having a total of 4 crew including the skipper: if each crew member from each boat raised an average donation of just \$20 from only 10 people they know, we could raise an easy \$24,000 and even more if ALL Club Members become involved and raised an average donation of \$20 from 10 people they each know - think of the possibilities!!! The top three fundraising boats from last year alone raised a total of almost \$12,000: Butler (Dave Ellis) \$5,700; Valuta (Bill Crum) \$4,700; and Airborne II (Rob Laden) \$1,415!

So whether you are a powerboater, a sail-boater, a Skipper or a crew member or a volunteer at the Regatta or a regular or associate Member with no involvement whatsoever in this event, it falls upon each of us to make a concentrated individual effort to have a positive, collective impact and together accomplish a truly notable and Great thing for a very worthwhile cause, raising funds for the United Way of the North Okanagan Columbia/Shuswap and the people they assist in our local communities.

The United Way is celebrating its <u>50</u>th year this year and what a tribute it would be to mark this milestone if we would just all pull together and raise \$50,000 – that would only require each of our 330 members to obtain \$20 donations from only 8 people each!!!



So get involved, get excited and sponsor a boat and a Skipper, whether you know a sailor or not (I've attached a summary of the race results from last year's Charity Regatta), then put their name and the name of their boat on the attached pledge form then come down to the Club during the races and cheer your boat and crew on or, just raise money for the Charity Regatta on behalf of the local chapter of the United Way without choosing a boat - either way just do it - it's a win-win for both our community and our Club!!!

- The race results had to be dried out on the notice board as they were soaked by the spray of the waves while the committee crash boat had to be bailed of at least one foot of water.



Now here is a rules question for the racers:


Two boats are approaching the finish line (at the committee boat end) on close hauled starboard tack. The boat closest to the committee boat is calling for room to tack. Does he break a



rule?

Since the anchored race committee boat is a mark that Red is fetching, Green cannot hail for room to tack without breaking Rule 20.3. Rule 20.3 "When Not to Hail" says, "A boat shall not hail unless safety requires her to make a substantial course change to avoid the obstruction. Also, she shall not hail if the obstruction is a mark that the hailed boat is fetching."




