Safe Boating Week May 26—June 1st

ypothermia. Say it out loud and it's an unpleasant sounding word.

But it has a simple meaning. It's when the core of your body drops to abnormally low body temperatures and if it goes too low and for too long eventually your heart can stop.

Many Canadian boaters are aware of hypothermia but most are not aware that it is the 'final stage' your body reaches after being in cold water. Many people die during the first few minutes of immersion in cold water and they are not hypothermic, they simply drown due to the immediate, involuntary and often deadly effects of cold water.

If you accidentally tumble into cold water, the initial cold shock will make you gasp and if you are underwater you can breath in about a litre of water. If you are on the surface, your heart rate can skyrocket, your breathing will be uncontrolled and increase as much 600 to 1000 percent. You can expect panic to set in as well. For most, this initial shock will last about a minute and then the breathing will slowly come back under control. Safe Boating is everyone's responsibility and a year long process.

Chilling Facts of Cold Water

Depending on the water temperature, over the next ten minutes or so you will experience Cold Incapacitation. As your body struggles to preserve its core temperature your limbs will become numb and your ability to self rescue or even simply continue to swim will become impaired. In cold water without a lifejacket, you will eventually become so incapacitated that you can no longer stay afloat.

If you do have a lifejacket on and have not been able to rescue yourself, even in the coldest water, you can expect to be conscious for about an hour and it will still be some time before you succumb to hypothermia. This will give rescuers plenty of additional time to find and rescue you.

There is one simple preventative measure that anyone can take to avoid drowning in cold water and to keep you floating if you become hypothermic. **Wear your lifejacket.** It guarantees that you will float, especially in those first critical minutes when just trying to catch your breath and figure out how to rescue yourself.

- Bob Montguire of the Coast Guard Auxiliary gave a verbal presentation. He stated that the intent of the Auxiliary Coast Guard is to help boaters ensure they have the proper equipment. The Auxiliary Coast Guard's mandate is boating safety and not acting in a policing capacity. There are presently 6 members on the Auxiliary Coast Guard.
- Ms. Alenna Cameron of Tobram Electrical Supply was invited to give a presentation about a B.C. Hydro rebate program which is designed to encourage an energy efficient up-grade for the lighting at our Club. The club will go ahead with changing bulbs and necessary fixtures. There will be an estimated annual savings of \$2540/year on hydro.
- The Club will purchase a VHF Radio for the Club Boat.
- A discussion was held regarding cameras being installed along the Paddlewheel Park side of the fence. There was vandalism to Lawrence's boat while being stored for winter.

- Presently we have 4- 20 foot slips available.
- We are way under budget for club expenses and breakwater repairs to date.
- We are still loosing money on the food. We will continue to monitor the situation for the next two months. When the food and bar expenses are looked at together we are making money.
- Tim was welcomed back. Tim felt that everything looked good and every-one seems happy.
- We have 12 new members and 7 new associates.
- Next meeting date is set for May 14, 2012.

hen I started this column I gave it a title that thought was appropriate for my favorite pas-I have been "messing time. about in boats" since I was a teenager in Britain just after the War ended. We used to ride our bikes a few miles to a local reservoir and rent a rowboat for an hour or so and just spend our time exploring the shore line, having races and just generally messing about. I think that this is what Kenneth Graham was referring to in "Wind in the Willows". It was a different time. There were no easily accessible fast powerboats, and sailboats were for the rich. These thoughts came to me as I was cleaning up and preparing my sailboat for another season. How our boating has changed!!! Technology has advanced so fast that boating is not just pottering around for a relaxing few hours. I rarely see anyone rowing a boat on the Lake and canoeing has become 'paddling' and is considered an athletic sport or competition.

These changes have affected other boating activities as well. Canadian Power and Sail Squadron was formed in the days when people with power boats big enough to go cruising joined together and developed competitions for 'Predicted Log Racing'. It wasn't really a race but an exercise in navigation, preferably in tidal waters. The skipper worked out a course and speed ahead of time and followed his course. without a clock, and the one to finish the course closest to the predicted time was the winner. This common interest in navigation was the backbone of CPS. Now CPS is wondering why the membership is declining and

and their boating classes are not attracting many students anymore. Navigation is being done by GPS and chart-plotters and other electronic instruments, which tend to relegate the obligatory paper charts to the chart drawer. The paper charts are only used in emergencies, that is if the captain knows how to read them and plot a course by hand!!

Last month I was talking about Collision Regulations and how the changing times have moved recreational boating out of relevance with the shipping rules that were drawn up for commercial traffic. We still have to obey the rules but they seem less relevant to the young fellow who has just bought his first water ski boat with its massive horsepower, or to the fly fisherman who has an electric motor to move easily around the mountain lake.

Messing About in Boats has changed a great deal in the last 50 -60 years, however it still seems to have a fascination for many people and we have to adapt to the times. I am sure that with the discoveries of new materials, more efficient motors, and even more sophisticated electronics we will see 'progress' but there is still a fascination with boats and the water and the apparent freedom and relaxation that they provide.
