

End to End Race 2012

he fourth annual End to End Race took place September 22nd & 23rd. The boats from VYC were Fyffe 11, Destiny and Fannasea. All made the long trip down to Summerland for the start of the event. Due to the shallow water and after hitting the bottom three times Fannasea was forced to drop anchor outside SYC. The good news is



after many years SYC has finally been given permission to dredge out the basin (see SYC webpage). Saturday 8:30 am was the race start time. A light breeze greeted the 26 boats as they lined up for the start of the first leg to Kelowna. After a very quiet first half hour, a light breeze could be seen on the west shore. Those boats on the west side of the lake were seen tacking in and out, trying to stay as close as possible to shore - too close for Aussie Rules as they ran aground on a sandbank and remained stuck for a good 10 minutes before getting underway again. Soon a nice steady breeze set in as the boats spread across the lake, after passing Squally Point the wind speed decreased. Passing Rattle Snake Island the wind increased, once again they were beating into the wind. During the afternoon the boats made good progress towards Kelowna. The first boat to finish Saturday's 21.4 N.M. leg was Ghost Rider from Kelowna with a time of 5 hours 43 minutes. The leading boats had good wind sailing under the bridge to the finish line. The slower boats were not so lucky running out of

wind in the afternoon and when the finish time of 5 pm arrived they were still 2 or 3 miles short of Kelowna.

Saturday evening saw all the sailors safely tied up in KYC. All except Skebangu, a Capri 22 from Kamloops Sailing Association, which had no motor and was forced to drop anchor. It didn't make it into KYC until after



9am the following morning half an hour after the start of Sunday's leg of the race.

Sunday morning 8:30 am saw the start of leg 2 to Vernon. Just like the day before the wind was very light at the start but at Trader's Cove it filled in from the north and we saw the boats heading up the lake. Before lunch time the wind eased, with the afternoon seeing Spinnakers come up as boats passed Whiskey Island and on to the finish at Cameron Point.



Nine of the 23 boats that started the Sunday leg finished before the 4pm deadline. The winner once again was Ghost Rider. Some boats turned around and headed home, however a number of boats continued on to VYC for supper and the awards.

All in all a wonderful weekend of sailing on Okanagan Lake. Of the Vernon boats Craig Williams on Fyffe 11 came 3rd in C Fleet while Brent Loshney on Destiny came 4th. Eric and Bronwen Young came 8th in B Fleet. This would be the last race for Fannasea on Okanagan Lake as Eric and Bronwen are moving to the Island.



They will be missed. Good Luck Eric and Bronwen. Here's wishing you fair winds and a safe passage.



s we put away our boats for the winter, let's not forget to remove all the evidence from the docks. This is not to prevent criminal prosecution, but to make sure that you don't leave lines or such, that may be a hazard to other boaters over the winter months. Many boats are left in the water over the winter, and the owners like to go and check up on them from time to time, especially after a snow fall. It might be rather unfortunate if someone tripped over a rope that was carelessly left on the dock to be covered by the snow.

In the past I have left the boat in over the winter and the Lake froze over, but it did not seem to bother the hull. The biggest hazard is when it starts to melt and there is a gap between the hull and the ice and the boat can rattle around in the 'ice hole'. Many of the larger boats that can't be taken out easily use a 'bubbler' to prevent the ice forming around the waterline. Some of the boats with lighter hulls, such as the racing sailboats, probably are better off out of the water, and that is why we have a Crane Day so that they can be lifted out onto trailers or stands for the winter. One disadvantage of storing the boat over the winter in the yacht club lot, is the fact that it is an open area and villains can come and steal equipment that is not secured or hidden away. Part of the process for winter storage must be carefully securing any equipment that can be stolen. Put as much as vou can into the cabin and make sure that it is securely locked. If you have an outboard motor it is best to remove it and take it home, even the best locking systems can be beaten by a determined villain if he (she) has the time to work at it.

As I was writing this column the latest edition of Pacific Yachting arrived, and guess what? The October edition of Pacific Yachting has an extensive article on "Winter Storage and Security". How timely! Although much of it applies to coastal marinas and storage yards, never-the-less there is some good advice on security and safe storage of your 'Pride and Joy'.

Even when the boat is safely stowed away it is never far from the mind of the enthusiastic boater and winter is a good time for planning maintenance and improvements for next year. By the way, the Power Squadron is planning to offer the CPS Marine Maintenance course (see page 13 in this newsletter).



Minutes Summary

October 11, 2012

Commodore's Dinner, Dance and Sail Past: Mike expressed his appreciation to the Executive and Club members who attended The Commodore's Dinner and Dance as well as the Sail Past. Both events had an excellent turnout and Honourable Mention was extended to Skipper Steve Cranton who anchored The Soggy Dollar to provide the reviewing platform for the Sail Past. There was also mention of confusion amongst the Power Boating members who thought they could not attend the event because it was coined a "Sail" Past. We will be sure that such confusion does not exist next year and stress that all sail and power boats are welcome to participate in the Sail Past.

The Quality of Life Society (QLS) invited Mike to a volunteer appreciation evening and they expressed their appreciation to the Vernon Yacht Club for providing moorage for the "Heaven Can Wait" boat. An average of 985 persons from the QLS enjoyed the outing on this boat from 2009 – 2012. Ron Heuman is the President of the Society and arranges to provide volunteers for these trips.

Osprey Tower: The parties that submitted a complaint to the VYC about the Osprey Tower and want it relocated do not want to share in the cost of doing so. Lawrence moved to vote on 'Leaving the Osprey Tower as it is with an addendum suggesting the complainants can move it further if they wish to". The executive was unanimously in favour of this.

Long Term Planning Meeting and Committee: Mike, Ed, and Lawrence and 14 members met to identify the long term goals of the VYC. Lawrence mentioned that his position as Vice Commodore charges him with the responsibility of being in charge of a Long Term Planning Committee (LTPC) and that the last time the VYC had one was in 2008. The Committee would be compiled of non-executive members and its purpose would be to determine and plan capital cost upgrades including the budget needed to execute them. The Committee would meet on a more regular basis than the Executive. It was also noted that 80% of the 2008 Long Term Plan has been completed.

Ed has had discussions with some companies that can have a look at the breakwater and recommended International Marine Floating Systems Inc. (IMF) to perform a survey of the concrete breakwater.

Winter Storage and Moorage of Boats: Members are filling out the necessary forms for storage of boats for the winter.

City Dance Co: The first round of dance lessons is underway and the turnout was good. The lessons will continue for another 4 weeks totalling 5. Some members said the \$11 for appetizers was too high and Mike suggested there could be simpler menu items offered to bring the cost down instead of a set buffet fee. Heather and Ruth provide dance lessons for the first ½ hour then students practice for the remainder.

Halloween Party. Val has recruited some volunteers to help her decorate the club for the Halloween Party. Boogie Nights will provide the music and Chilli, buns and salads will be offered around 10:00 PM

Five Squared: Sailing in Desolation Sound

ur recent six-week summer cruise over the Salish Sea to Desolation Sound gave the crew of Windfall plenty of free time to compose our condensed version of the '5 knot summer'. The list soon grew to 25 (5x5) knots, naughts, knots of speed, donuts and not to miss experiences.

Five Frequently Useful Knots.

The 'bowline'



a most common knot, re-tied very often on constantly tangled genoa and spinnaker sheets.

The 'round turn and two halfhitches'



used 2 or 3 times each day to tie up the dinghy after dog walks ashore.

The 'reef knot'



while not actually used for 'reefing' this knot seemed to work well to secure the 300 pound anchor the crew pulled up each day.

A 'rolling hitch'



came into play in raising cozy neighbors anchor rode from ours, twice!

And finally, the 'clove hitch'



with too much practice the crew could tie five fenders to the lifelines in 60-seconds when the dyslexic skipper switches from port to starboard ties.

The Five 'Naughts'

First, and most critical. Thou shall naught run out of beer.

A close second. The skipper shall naught ask the crew to go below and fetch items, particularly beer.

Third. It is naught a good plan to anchor under another boats anchor rode (see rolling hitch page 17).

Fourth, following from three. Thou shall naught scold the Sheltie from barking at boats anchoring too close.



And a minor fifth. The skipper shall naught forget the crews bathing costume in the car at the marina car park, unless he applies sufficient SPF60 sun cream to the affected areas.

Five Knots (per hour)

This is the speed the sailing yacht *Windfall* motored for most of the summer.

Five knots (faster) seems to be the speed most other yachts can motor.

Fortunately, five knots is the speed *Windfall* sails using her spinnaker in six knots of wind.

- 3- Waterfalls in Princess Louisa Inlet, Teakern Arm and Toba Inlet.
- 4- Harvesting clams, oysters, prawns, crabs and fish from the sea and huck-le berries and black berries from the land.
- 5- Meeting wonderful people everywhere we went, perhaps we'll see you next year.
