### Commodore's Report Tim Amy

pop up unexpectedly. Some are once in a life time events and need to be seriously considered for their long term costs/benefits. The VYC started as two lots in the 1950's and over the years several adjoining lots have been purchased to

achieve the current boundaries of VYC land property. The last purchase was the lot which is now the western side of the property, purchased during the 1980's. There was much debate at the time, and some of you no doubt remember the details. Could the membership afford the mortgage payments; as a then small club of local residents why was more land needed.

Unexpectedly, the owner of a waterfront lot immediately adjacent to VYC has expressed interest in selling the lot to VYC. It is 50' wide with frontage onto Lakeshore and preliminary inquiries suggest it is affordable. Your Executive will carefully investigate this opportunity and provide members with information. A decision to proceed to purchase would require a General meeting and vote by members.

My own thoughts are: In years to come, expanding the VYC moorage further north out into the lake will encounter engineering difficulties in the deeper water and be exposed to more heavy wind and wave pressure. There is likely to be growing public resistance to pushing the moorage structure further out into the public boating area. Expanding the moorage to the east will likely be limited by development of Paddle Wheel Park as a public use area. Expanding the moorage to the west would entail moving the existing concrete breakwater 60' west and adding at least one dock (60 slips) between it and existing A dock. Acquiring the adjacent lot to the west would open possibilities for relocating a new club house 10-15 years hence. There are limits to growth, at what point does VYC reach an optimum moorage and membership size. Will demographics of an aging

population, increased cost of living and reduced expendable income limit membership and VYC income in foreseeable future. If purchased but later found to be unneeded the lot could be sold. And no doubt you have some ideas on this opportunity!

In the mean time the VYC annual Pig Roast was again a sold out mouth watering success, a cast of many turning the spit to perfection. The Pig Roast has been a VYC tradition since 1991. It is this sort of members' driven, everyone pitching in, informal socializing which energizes VYC as a community. Reminiscent of branding time in the Alberta foothills, (without the prairie oysters) prairie grain thrashing parties, or a large backyard barbeque, neighbors coming together cooperatively.

Throughout the week your food and bar manager Rick Reichelt along with his team are putting on some very excellent and well attended eating experiences. Let them know your thoughts. Your Executive made a decision early this year that VYC would not pursue becoming a full service restaurant. Food complements socializing and recreational boating but we are not in the restaurant business. VYC is a members driven cooperative interested in the 'common good'. VYC is NOT a top down corporation, interested in maximizing profit for a few.

Is it true that stick boaters are more athletic, more fit, more competitive, more organized, and generally more active than stink boaters? The Clubs sailing members bring many organized sailing events, regattas, to the VYC. It's past time for power boaters to organize interclub boating events such as poker runs or timed navigation activities.

The 2011 boating season is winding down for many of you, though some will sail all winter. Please remember to put the VYC Annual General Meeting on your calendar for the evening of Monday November 28<sup>th</sup>. The 2011 budget will be reviewed and the 2012 budget presented. Rob Ladan has kindly agreed to chair the nomination committee to present members standing for the 2012 Executive.

Enjoy the Fall weather, often a most peaceful and colourful time for boating on the Okanagan.

A reminder to all new members who have not yet obtained moorage: Please make sure your name is on the wait list for moorage posted outside the downstairs office.

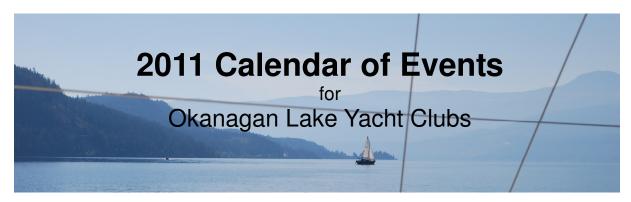

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# Messing About in Boats by Dave Atkins

month I talked about cour-Last tesy between boaters, but this month I want to go a little deeper and deal with a few misconceptions about the rules which govern our conduct on the water. Over the years I have taught many classes for the Canadian Power and Sail Squadron, some of them were the courses for the regular boating programs but also many for the PCOC card since it was introduced 10 years ago. There are a few commonly held misconceptions about the "Rules of the Road" which seem to have grown up during the years. The "Rules of the Road" as we sometimes describe them are in fact based on International Treaties for "Prevention of Collisions at Sea" sometimes refereed to as "The Collision Regulations". These regulations have been developed over many years for the regulation of vessel traffic on all navigable waterways. Navigable waterways include all the worlds oceans and seas and also the rivers connecting to them which are "navigable" by commercial vessels. There are areas like the Great Lakes and other large inland lakes which are classified as "navigable waterways"

because there is or has been commercial traffic. Okanagan Lake is classified as a "navigable waterway" and thus subject to the conditions of the Collision regulations.

Pleasure boaters are for the most part governed by the same regulations as commercial shipping, but there has to be some "interpretation" of the rules as they apply to small recreation craft. Firstly the rules as set out for pleasure craft apply to all waters on which they operate, that is if you go onto Swan Lake, which is not a navigable waterway, the rules still apply for pleasure Thus vessels on a collision course with each other apply the same rules as large ships for avoiding collision. Thus the rule "If to starboard red appear it is your duty to stay clear" That is if another vessel is approaching your vessel on the right hand side it is your duty to change course to avoid a collision. The other vessel has a duty to hold his course. so that he doesn't cause confusion.

I have run into some misunderstanding of the terms "towing" and "fishing" Under the regulations towing applies to vessels towing barges and log booms' etc which are "restricted in their ability to maneuver", it does not include towing a water skier!! Fishing applies to commercial fish boats that have large nets or

trolls in the water and are therefore "restricted in their ability to maneuver". Having a couple of fishing lines over the stern does not qualify as fishing under the regulations. So use common sense and avoid confrontation with other vessels and don't expect them to give you privileges that you are not entitled to under the rules.

The definition of a vessel that is "underway" is sometimes misunderstood. It is not necessary to be moving to be "underway" according to the rules. A vessel is "underway" if it is floating free - not attached to a mooring, and not anchored, the rule doesn't say anything about being in motion. The rules for avoiding collisions applies to all vessels that are "underway".

When you are driving a boat, whether it is power or sail, you have a responsibility to exercise caution, act responsibly and pay attention to the job of steering and controlling the boat above all else. If you want to go sight seeing or watching the water skiers, get someone else to run the boat.

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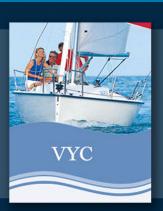


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#### **October: Autumn Colours Galore**

that the Autumn Solstice has passed, we experience the magic of the fall colors reflecting in the quiet waters surrounding our marine basin. Many lovely boating afternoons await us. Hockey once again has taken flight on frozen waters, CFL football is entering its final run for the playoffs and Baseball World Series dominates the sports channels. A sports lovers dream to be sure. Do take time to enjoy some special moments on the water, it is truly magical.

Which leads us to ongoing security at our Club. 2011 has been a good year in the prevention of untoward activity. We have only one weekend of reported incidents.

We do hope that members report anything unusual to the Office or Executive. The VYC Security Team, comprising of 36 Club members have been diligent providing off hours vigilance throughout the boating season March through October.

As of the end of August we have completed 203 shifts accounting for 609 hours of coverage. Add another 60 shifts for September and October and our totals will be 263 shifts for 789 hours coverage. And, we are under budget, Not bad for members volunteering their time to protect everyone's property at the Club. Added to the Team's active security is the increased vigilance

by members when they are at the Club. This cooperative effort is going a long way to keeping the VYC unattractive to would be intruders.

However, we must remain diligent and vigilant... soon boats will appear 'on the hard' for winter storage which presents a new attraction to undesirable characters. Be aware, be on guard..... and look out for the "ghosts and goblins" at month's end.



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#### Ship's Bells

The origin of the ship's bell dates back to the time of Columbus. Time was kept using the sandglass clock, and was the essential device for marking time at sea. The sea day was divided into four-hour shifts or watches. Using the sandglass clock, the helmsman would signal the passing of each half hour increment, with the striking of the chime or bell, starting with one "bell" at the end of the first half hour, two "bells" at the end of the second half hour, and so on until reaching "eight bells", which signaled the end of the four-hour watch.

#### The watch periods were:

Middle Watch	Midnight to 4:00 am
Morning Watch	4:00 am to 8:00 am
Forenoon Watch	8:00 am to noon
Afternoon Watch	Noon to 4:00 pm
First Dog Watch	4:00 pm to 6:00 pm
Second Dog Watch	6:00 pm to 8:00 pm
First Watch	8:00 pm to midnight

#### The Ship's Bell Code

12:00	4:00	8:00	=	8 Bells
12:30	4:30	8:30	=	1 Bell
1:00	5:00	9:00	=	2 Bells
1:30	5:30	9:30	=	3 Bells
2:00	6:00	10:00	=	4 Bells
2:30	6:30	10:30	=	5 Bells
3:00	7:00	11:00	=	6 Bells
3:30	7:30	11:30	=	7 Bells
4:00	8:00	12:00	=	8 Bells

On some ships, at the end of the First Dog Watch, only four bells were struck. Then the bells of the Second Dog Watch were struck like this: 6:30 pm, one bell; 7:00 pm, two bells; 7:30 pm, three bells; 8:00 pm, eight bells.

The reason behind the existence of the Dog Watches is that in order for the crew to rotate through all the watches it was necessary to split one of the watches in half, to create an odd number of watches in a ship's day. This allowed the sailors to stand different watches instead of one team being forced to stand the mid-watch every night. The choice of time also allows both watches, if there are only two, to eat an evening meal at about the traditional time.

The tradition of the sandglass clock continued for hundreds of years until the development of the mechanical clock sometime during the 19<sup>th</sup> Century.

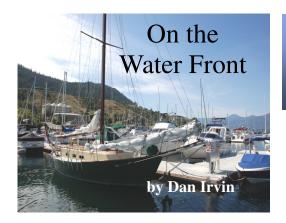

# Winter Power

#### Writing this segment

on the first day of fall seems appropriate although recent temperatures make winter power concerns seem like a long way off. However, installation of the final three kilowatt hour meters is being completed this month, and the first billing period of the winter power season starts in October, so it may help to recap and update what has happened on this front. More over-wintering boats of larger sizes were driving up the cost of power consumption to the point where it was necessary to either raise everyone's cost unfairly or apportion it based on consumption. VYC embarked on a program to apportion winter power billing on the docks last year and the program has been successful on two fronts. With the range of power use varying between a few dollars a month and hundreds of dollars a month, charging for use individually was the only realistic option. Overall VYC power bills dropped significantly as individual members became aware of, and

started paying for, the amount of power they were consuming. The accompanying benefit of realizing significant conservation gains naturally follows.

The choice of heater is the most significant factor in how much you will pay. If you are using a heater that does not have a frost setting or a low enough temperature setting then you will pay too much to keep your boat from freezing. The common little ceramic cube heaters are probably one of the worst choices. While they may be efficient as a small space auxiliary heater they do not have a low enough setting. They typically will "kick in" at about 15 degrees even on the lowest setting so they run 24/7 trying to keep your boat that warm even when the temperature is well above freezing. Check your heater specs to find out what the limits are. If you are considering a new heater this year consider this one. I have been using two of these heaters for two years now and they work well for keeping the boat frost free without keeping it too warm. They are available from local suppliers such

as Fisher's Hardware and are currently on sale at

www.stevestonmarine.com (Part # 9206CA-BBX) See pic below.
