### Commodore's Report Tim Amy



The short Canadian summer is blazing past and I am keeping my eyes open for Christmas presents. Found a wonderfull wireless radio controlled heli-

copter on sale at the Taswwassen ferry terminal a few weeks ago, bought it as Xmas present for my 24 year old son, but now thinking he may be a bit old for it, may have to keep it myself.

The North Okanagan Regional District has launched a review of current demand and future projections for boating, leading to a comprehensive 20 year plan for delivery of boating services in the Vernon area. A report is expected later this year following 'consultation' and fact finding with various boating interests. Vernon Yacht club will be represented at these meetings, some of them to be held at VYC.

An initial economic analysis finds that during 2009 the 250 boats in the Vernon Yacht Club moorage contributed directly and indirectly to the Vernon area economy.

The VYC fleet alone is calculated to support approximately 30 full time equivalent jobs and adds over \$2 million annually to the Vernon economy. VYC members purchase mechanic services, fuel, parts, insurance, pizza and beer enroute to boating. Then there are the many boaters who are not VYC members, all spending \$\$ on boating and related services. Then there are the operating costs of the VYCmarina itself, monies spent into the local economy and yet to be factored in to the equation.

The availability or lack of boating services has tourism implications for the area. Launching and moorage facilities limit or promote boating. By Fall the North Okanagan boating picture will be more clear, enabling planners and decision makers to make more educated choices. It is anticipated that results when published will be available to the public and VYC members.

Feel like a broken record but we are assembling the business plan for Phase II dock renewal and expansion and will make this info available to members asap.

You have better things to do than reading this stuff.

# Messing About in Boats Dave Atkins

may seem a little out This of date when you read it but a recent boating it but a recent boating accident

Shuswap Lake between a houseboat and a powerboat created quite a bit of discussion about Boating Safety and what should be done to prevent such accidents. The usual calls for more enforcement and licensing of boaters really didn't get to the heart of the matter in my opinion. We have tried licensing, all boaters should have a PCOC card by now, and enforcement, while possible is not easy. Just think about the highways, we have enforcement but most drivers still exceed the speed limits and many ignore the stop signs and traffic lights so that there are plenty of collisions. The highway system is well organized and the traffic is in well defined lanes, so if it doesn't work too well there, how can it work on the wide open waterways.



Safety is more than a set of rules, it is more a state of mind. We have had "Collision Regulations" for years, or rather more correctly "Rules for the prevention of Collisions at Sea". The small craft regulations are based on these and adapted for the smaller vessels and more restricted environment. Safety is more an attitude and it has to be developed at a personal level. Industry spends a lot of time and money on Safety training because it is "cost effective." Accidents create expensive downtime and compensation. How can society make boating safety "cost effective"? In boating it is more up to the individual to develop a safety attitude.

Unfortunately society has spent a lot of time and money "entertaining" the population for many years with violent movies and video games that do not encourage an attitude of concern for other people, just a selfish competitive attitude of "me first" This is not the best way to generate a safety attitude in a recreation pastime that involves sharing the waterways with others and being concerned with their safety. I am also sure that the prevalence of substance abuse as part of recreation doesn't help the situation

Boating is an individual pastime or recreation which is meant to be enjoyable, why else would you do it? However it is done in conjunction with other boaters and a concern for their safety is as important as your own safety. Developing a positive attitude and being safety conscious, with concern for others, cannot be done by rules or enforcement, it has to be done by the individual.





# Where there's smoke...

...there's some guy selling fire extinguishers. Well not really selling extinguishers here but raising the issue so that VYC members are aware of an upcoming service that we can all take advantage of. Fire extinguishers are one of those things like the rusty jack in the trunk of your car. Hopefully you'll never need it but boy you're screwed without it if it doesn't perform up to snuff, pun intended, when you do. And when you do need it the last thing you want to find out is that the fire extinguisher you really need to use right now was last serviced way before your long deceased uncle Charlie's second cousin in Florida bought the boat from a hurricane salvage dealer at an auction where the only part of the boat visible above the swamp was the masthead. This is not the fire extinguisher you want. These are usually the extinguishers stored with the spare parts under the lifejackets in the lazarette that you can't find the key for. No sailor you want the shiny red one, correctly sized for your boat, fixed securely to a bulkhead in the location specified in the Small Vessel Regulations of the Canada Shipping Act. Oh yes it's all there at http://www.qp.gov.sk.ca/documents/ english/Regulations/federal/ c1487.pdf.

In uncommonly simple language for a bureaucratic document they spell out for each size of boat the type, number of, and location for fire extinguishers. For example if you have a PWC or any other boat under six meters with: a fixed fuel tank; or an inboard engine; or a fuel burning heating, cooking or refrigeration appliance you are required to have a Class 5 B,C fire extinguisher. A class five is one of those extinguishers about 3" in diameter. Between 6 meters and 8 meters you still need a Class 5 B,C but you may need two or more depending on the amenities you have in your boat. Over 8 meters and you are required to have a Class 10 B,C extinguisher or more likely multiple extinguishers depending on how many of the amenities listed in the regulations you have aboard and where in the boat they are. Class 10 B,C extinguishers are the ones about 5" in diameter. In Layman's terms these two types of extinguisher are usually referred to as a 2 ½ pound and a 5 pound. Of course this little bulletin is not the last word on this matter. I am merely raising the issue and directing you to the agency you can verify for yourself what is required for you and your boat.

What this bulletin is though is a notification that with the assistance of Director Dean Myrfield and Director Me VYC members will have a one stop shop to solve all their fire extinguisher needs. A date will soon be announced via email, signal flag, ship to shore wireless telegraph, Tiller Topics, smoke signal, morse code, semaphore flags and whatever other means we can avail ourselves of, for,

wait for the drum roll, VYC Fire Extinguisher Day. With an exciting title like that how could you not want to participate. This exciting event will allow members to place their extinguishers in a specified location, most likely the clubhouse basement, before the big day, fill out the name tags provided and just like magic, without the puff of smoke of course, your fire extinguisher will be recertified for the following twelve months. Recharging will also be available provided your extinguisher does not look like it came off the boat in the first paragraph of this article. If it does you will be notified that you need a new one. Clues that you need a new fire extinguisher are rust, dents, general poor condition and in some cases a plastic head.

If all this seems like a lot of work just compare it with explaining to your insurance adjuster why your fire extinguisher was old enough to have been used on the San Francisco fire, and maybe was. Worse yet try explaining to your significant other that your insurance claim was denied because your fire extinguisher hadn't been recertified since way before the garage sale you bought it in. Yup, it's worth doing and Dean and I are going to make it easy for you. Just watch for the notification and more details in this space and other VYC notifications.

When we returned from our sailing trip to the Danish Islands, a couple of people suggested that we write an article about our experience. My first thought was: who would be interested in the exploits of two 'rusty' sailors getting back to the sport after many years on dry land? A few more gentle prods and we finally decided to go ahead anyway.

We had been feeling that our sailing skills could really use a tune-up! A good friend of ours had been asking us to come over to Germany/Denmark and cruise with him. What better way to 'tune up' than to combine it with some travel? Nowhere would we be more likely to receive such expert coaching than at the hands/tiller of Dieter Bondzus and his wife, Chrischi. Dieter (Kiel, Germany) is one of the most respected international blue water racing skippers of his generation. This in a country that lives and breathes sailing. He is retired from those exploits and now cruises the Danish Islands in his sporty, 10m (32 ft), Danish built Nordborg.

So as we prepared for the trip, our friends sailed north from Kiel to Copenhagen. That's where we met them and boarded 'Loreena'. We were there to learn as well as to visit. After some fond reminiscing we were put to work. 'Your turn on the tiller' announced Dieter. Humm... a tiller eh? Last time I saw one of these I was in a Laser. Oh well, it'll come back to me. Think: push right go left. 'Tack now' came the next order. How on earth do I get to the other side of this thing? Oh... its

much more doable when you fold back the extension. Shoulda thought of that first ... A solution eventually came to me. 'Think dingy' I said to myself and sure enough my mind switched gears. I forgot about boat size and skipped back to the feeling that I used to know. Voila! No more confusion. Next came the 2 finger rule. 'Its getting a bit tough to hold onto this tiller, Dieter, and the wind has freshened.' 'Oh, you shouldn't have to work that hard, two fingers is all you need, is his reply. Seconds later the main is down to its first reef and after a few more minor adjustments, a child could have taken over the helm. Lesson learned: balance the sails. Listen and feel what the wind and the boat are telling you. Don't over analyze in a 'bookish' sort of way. There is no glory in hanging on for dear life, and the yacht will also be happier.

Denmark is situated just north of Kiel, Germany (where Loreena is moored). It is about a 4 hour sail to

reach Danish waters. The ocean there is the Baltic. The Baltic, we learned very quickly, is shallow. In fact, if the sea level went down a metre, Denmark would gain a significant amount of real estate. Loreena's keel draws 1.6 m (5.5 ft) of water. At one point

The transponder reported a depth of 1.5 m (5 ft) below its tip. That translates into a grand total of about 3 m (10 ft) total depth. And all this during a beat in strong winds with gusts to force 8! The upside to this lack of depth? When the wind does subside, so do the choppy waves and there are no left over rollers to contend with. Lesson learned: charts are great but a GPS mapper is better (in this case) and it should be consulted frequently. A friend of Dieter's didn't do this and now he has a rock named after him. Jurgen has sailed the Baltic all his life. One day he took a short cut and found the only shallow rock for miles around. Something went thump but he kept on going. Upon arriving home, he noticed that his yacht was floating a little higher in the water. Inspection revealed that the entire lead bulb was gone from the bottom of the keel! 'Never mind' he said, 'I know where it is'. Eventually he retrieved it and the lead was bolted back on. Lesson: avoid over confidence and know where you are... for sure. (to be continued in October's Tiller)



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
