

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Messing About in Boats by Dave Atkins

As you read this we are looking at the end of summer, but what a summer it was, certainly not the usual pattern that we expect in the Okanagan Valley. How was your boating? Did you follow the usual pattern and get out on the water regardless of the conditions? I didn't. Maybe I am just getting older or maybe getting bored with the same old routine, but in any case it was not a good year of sailing for me. One of the things that I find annoys me more as time goes by is the wave action on the Lake caused by powerboats, especially on days when there is very little wind. These are days of conflict between power and sail. Sailors have to try and nurse the small amount of wind that is there and rocking around in the waves tends to kill the slight forward motion that has been achieved. The powerboats like the same conditions because they can go fast without banging around and the

skiers and wake boarders can maintain better control in flat water. The wake boarders set up their boats to kick up a large stern wake so that they can ride the wave.


Such is the inevitable conflict between power and sail. I don't presume to offer a solution, there really isn't one without segregation of boating types, power boats over there, sail boats over here. Who wants to start that fight? It is of course impractical, we cherish our freedom of choice and would not like to give up our favorite pleasure so that someone else could enjoy the spot. We have to share the lake with other boaters of all kinds. even the kayakers and the canoes and the sailboarders. We all enjoy the access to the lakes and we have to learn to live with it.

We should all be aware of the "Rules of the Road" which govern the conduct of all boaters on all waters, after all you have a PCOC card if you operate a boat with a power source, but there are a few boaters in non-powered boats that don't need a card, but they don't usually cause enough wake to interfere with other boats. In any case there are things to be aware of that are outside the rules. Courtesy and consideration go a long way to-

wards happy boating and they are based on knowledge. Knowledge of what other types of boats can do and how they normally operate. Courtesy toward other boaters so that the effects of your boating don't adversely affect other people, for example if you see a group of sailboats sailing close together, they are probably racing and they are concerned that conditions don't slow them down. Waves do slow the boat even when there is good wind. A sailor probably shouldn't insist on "right-of-way" through an obvious slalom course in use by skiers.

Maybe I want to live in fantasy land, but the long standing antagonism between power and sail can be somewhat modified with a little understanding and tolerance for the other boaters and that starts with knowledge of boats and their characteristics. Maybe befriend a boater of the other persuasion. If you have never sailed I am sure that there is someone who would take you out for an enjoyable afternoon sail, and likewise if you haven't been on a modern high speed power boat you could find someone to give you a demonstration. It might be fun and it would certainly be educational, and maybe I will wake up in Paradise one day!!!

Visitor Slip Procedures

at the Kelowna Yacht Club

Hello Fellow Yacht Clubs,

In order to ensure that all visiting yacht club members can enjoy mooring privileges at the Kelowna Yacht Club, we have summarized the procedures below for booking visitor slips in our marina. We would appreciate you circulating these procedures to your individual Club members.

- 1) The Kelowna Yacht Club maintains 6 visitor slips for visiting members from other yacht clubs that also offer reciprocal mooring privileges.
- 2) Our visitor slips are reserved on a first-come, first-serve basis, by calling our administration office at (250)762-3310 ext. 221,222, or 225.
- 3) Whether a slip is required for a few hours or overnight, a reservation with our office is necessary. Our office hours are Mon-Fri., 9:00AM to 5:00PM and Sat., 9:00AM to 2:00PM.
- 4) We will require a copy of the visiting member's valid insurance as well as a copy of the membership card. If required. A gate card

will be allocated to the visiting member for a deposit of \$20. A visitor decal will also be supplied to the visiting member and needs to be affixed in a visible location on their boat.

- 5) A visitor slip number will be confirmed with the visiting member once all of the requested documentation is on hand at the office.
- 6) The visiting member can pick up his decal and gate key at the office during regular business hours (until 9:00PM)
- 7) Please understand that a visiting member is not to occupy a slip other than the visitor slip assigned. Non-compliance will result in the vessel being removed from the marina.

Thank you and we look forward to seeing you at the KYC.







Treasurer Report

Now that the weather is warm, I hope that everyone has had opportunity to get out and enjoy the beautiful Okanagan Lake.

We are now at the nine month mark of

our current fiscal year and our club continues to perform well financially. All of our revenue sources have met or exceeded the budget approved by the membership last fall. Membership dues for the current year are \$156,000 with an additional \$99,000 in initiation fees received up to the end of July. Besides the normal monthly payments to the credit union, the initiation fees received have also been used to directly pay down the long-term debt of the club.

Moorage is our largest revenue source with \$270,000 received for the current year. Advertising, the boat show and the bar receipts are all also in excess of budget. Thanks to everyone for pitching in to help support the club by volunteering and patronizing our club.

Expenses overall have been kept within budget although costs continue to rise and there are always unforeseen bills. The executive has spent funds to improve both the grounds and the clubhouse while continuing to maintain the breakwater and slips.

The dock expansion capital project has come in at a total expenditure of \$449,000. This is under the budget of \$453,000 set by membership at the AGM and a tremendous accomplishment for the club. Only a few more wooden docks to be replaced....

My thanks to the executive who have been diligent in keeping costs under control while making the club the envy of the valley!



Well it isn't exactly running away to sea but if it was it could look something like this: Land in Boston, head for Mystic Seaport to rent a little Riverside Class dinghy built by wooden boat school, and sail around the harbor just to get warmed up; head for the rendezvous in Rockland ME and the 50' Schooner "Dove 2" with

skipper/ owner Mike Taber for ten days of sailing with minimal crew around Penobscot Bay:

Greyhound 'er up to meet with Dr. David Edsal and head for his Lock Crowther designed 47 Kevlar Catamaran, "What's Up Doc" to sail from Somserset MA to Chester Basin NS via Newport RI, Martha's Vineyard, Nantucket and Lunenberg NS; boot'er down to Hubbards Cove NS for a day in the 50th annual NS Schooner Association Race Week aboard the 106. (that is one hundred and six) year old 40' schooner "Adare"; a final day of racing on the beautiful 1966 built mahogany on oak 47' schooner "Avenger"; an awesome daysail from Hubbards Cove back to Lunenberg on Avenger; and finally a great daysail in

the Lehave River to wrap it all up.

Including the little tour aboard a 75 year old Cat that made 7 sailboats in three weeks. Being unable to find a boat sailing back to the Boston area in

time for my flight home I rearranged the return leg from Halifax and flew home happy. I believe all the boats in quotation marks have websites or blogs.

A couple of these boats have made remarkable voyages

including 80,000 sea miles for Avenger, extended world cruising for "What's Up Doc", and of course if you are a history buff the schooner "Adare" was the only boat racing that day that was at the inaugural Schooner Week in 1961.

The longer legs were arranged through crew-seeker type websites so if you are prepared to wing it, rough it, and go with the flow there is a lot of sailing out there to be had.



THERMO REGULATION

Thermoregulation is the term for the body's ability to maintain its core temperature (i.e., heart, lungs and brain) within specified boundaries. Normal core temperature ranges between 36.5° C and 37.5°C. This control is primarily provided by a portion of the brain called the hypothalamus which initiates a variety of responses to temperature fluctuations signaled by temperature receptors in the skin and core.

When the body is too warm, one cooling response is <u>vasodilation</u> which expands the blood vessels to increase blood flow to the periphery. This process may also be accompanied by sweating (another cooling response).

When the body is too cool, body heat is preserved: <u>vasoconstriction</u> narrows blood vessels to decrease blood flow to the extremities (hands/feet) and therefore decrease heat loss.

The brain may also initiate shivering thermogenesis to generate more heat. Shivering is an extremely effective means of creating body heat. At rest, we normally generate approximately 100 watts of heat. But when vigorous shivering occurs in the early stages of cold exposure and mild nypothermia, it can increase heat production op to 500 watts. Shivering is a good thing - it not only slows the onset of hypothermia but can also be an important aid in post-rescue rewarming. When attempting to aid a potentially hypothermic victim, given the choice of drink, it would be better to offer a cold drink with sugar (to fuel shivering) than give them a warm drink that relies only on heat for rewarming (like warm water). The best possible option would be a warm chocolate drink that provides both heat and energy. Note: Be careful, however. Fluid should only be provided in cases of mild hypothermia where the victim is conscious, alert and won't choke.
