VICE COMMODORE REPORT



Well if you read the last issue of the Tiller Topics, or still even if you hadn't, you may be thinking I'm off my rocker!

The long anticipated floating steel breakwater sections, which in my last Tiller report I had advised the largest of them was to have been installed by early May, are fully constructed and still temporarily moored at the old log dump just north of Trader's Cove due to an on-going review by the province of the adequacy of the mooring systems

A third party peer review of the mooring systems, requested by the Ministry, was conducted in November of 2021. It was determined the mooring systems were not adequate after new wind and wave data revealed through a new wind and wave study we had commissioned for the next expansion phase of the marina was applied.

Modifications to the mooring systems were made by our contractor (increasing the number of the 18,000 lb. anchors to 8 up from 6 for BW1 and to 18 anchors up from 12 for BW2; 4,500 lb. kellet weights to be added to each anchor; anchors hangars were rotated to reduce side load on the pocket; etc.), all of which were reviewed by the project engineer in late January of this year.

Unfortunately, however, the project engineer's written response confirming the adequacy of these modifications to withstand the revised conditions wasn't received until mid-April, which we provided to the Ministry shortly thereafter.

As soon as the Ministry received the third-party review and the project engineers' response, we were required to stop all over-water work until the Ministry could conduct their own review of the material provided, and now, here we wait.

We have made a request of the Ministry to allow us to proceed with installation of both BW1 and BW2 with these new modifications while their review continues just as soon as our contractor is available. The contractor had scheduled our project to be completed by the end of June and are now booked for July and August.

If the on-going review determines further modifications are deemed necessary, these can be added at a later date on-site.

A decision from the Ministry on this request is anticipated any day now.

With all that has been going on with the breakwater replacement project these past few months and other items, scheduling for some "town hall" meetings for input into the Longterm Plan has been delayed, but we hope to make some announcements soon. Please stay tuned and do your best to attend and provide your input.

Hopefully the weather will begin to improve and things settle down so that perhaps one day soon we'll even be able to get out on the water!

REAR COMMODORE REPORT



It has certainly been a steady pace around the club this spring. Several projects have been completed and more are in progress.

Spring Clean Up

It was a very good turn out for the event and quite an impressive list of items were completed. Thank you for all those that participated. It made a huge difference!

D Dock Rub Rails

There has been a very impressive number of volunteers that offered to lend a hand. This is a significant project and work will continue through the summer. For those of you moored on D Dock, it would greatly assist the volunteers if you could temporarily remove any dock edge guards you have installed and rely on your fenders until the rub rail crew replaces your rub rails. It would significantly speed up the process for these volunteers as it's quite time consuming for them to remove and reinstall your dock edge guards on top of replacing the wooden rub rails. Please make life easier for these volunteers who are helping ensure your vessels are able to be safely and securely moored.

Clubhouse Deck Awnings

The old awnings had seen better days and have now been replaced. They are looking quite nice!

East Fence

The spring clean-up crew was able to remove and dispose of all of the old fence boards on clean-up day. The posts, which were set in concrete, were removed shortly following that by a contractor. A new chain-link fence is scheduled to be installed by a contractor in the latter portion of June or early July.

Painting

The spring clean-up crew was able to paint the yellow concrete blocks in the visitor parking, B Dock fence, the picnic tables and the west storage shed, which really started to make things look nice. Since that time, the gate house has been painted, and the clubhouse painting is nearing completion.

Clubhouse Deck Gutters

The winter freeze / thaw cycles we have here in the Okanagan have resulted in a significant build-up of ice on the parking lot underneath the clubhouse deck in front of the north entrance door. In order to reduce the potential for ice build-up at that location, the club has installed gutters on the north side of the deck to direct moisture away from running off the north side of the deck directly onto the parking lot. The contractors have installed the gutters and will be returning to complete the flashing installation.

Deck BBQS

The Club was receiving quite a bit of feedback from the members utilizing the two BBQs on the west side of the clubhouse deck. In particular, that even with the awnings down and with the BBQs side by side, one BBQ is always in the rain.

In order to provide the best solution to the problem, a permanent gas line was installed that allows the second BBQ to be permanently placed under the east awning. This will keep both BBQs out of the rain and give the BBQers much more elbow room.

That is the significant news; now all that we need is for warmer weather to arrive!
