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REAR COMMODORE REPORT



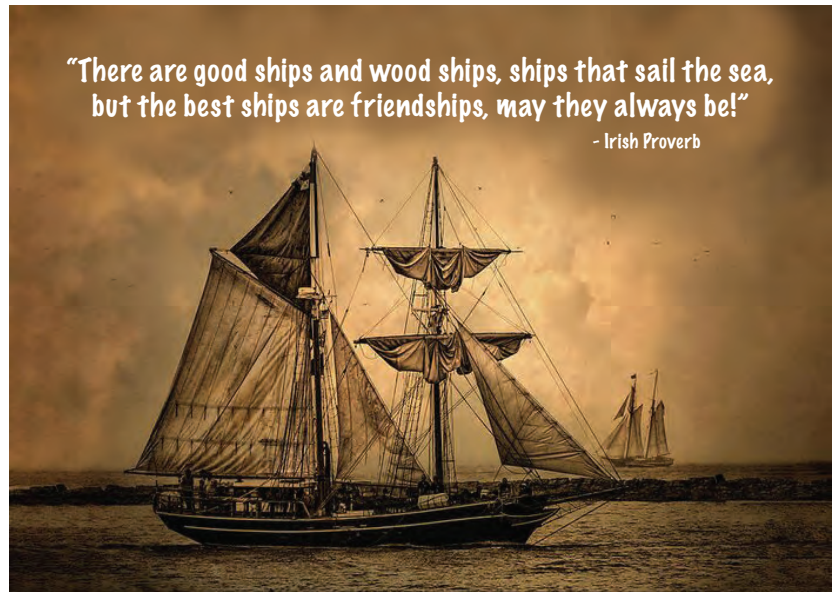
Looking back, now that the spring Crane Day has passed, it has been quite a busy off-season this year. During the winter we had a few unplanned events on the docks. The electrical supply cable in the trough on "B" dock failed. Repairs were enacted and several breakers in the cabinets required replacing. Last month during an extreme wind and wave event the connecting chains broke on the older concrete breakwater. Repairs were performed with minimal damage to the concrete sections.

There was an early morning theft of two dock cart wheels a few weeks ago where the perpetrator cut the chain link fence at the dock entrance. We are looking into enhancing our security surveillance and procedures.

Over the last few weeks, the deck surface and railings were replaced at the clubhouse. During this process Ryan, our maintenance manager seized the opportunity to identify and repair rotting sections of the deck. Several PVC chairs and tables on the deck have also been replaced.

It's shaping up to be another great year at VYC – I'm looking forward to seeing you at the club and on the water!

RON HEUMAN

AND A TILLER TOPICS BLAST FROM THE PAST

At the *Vernon Yacht Club*, a conversation between TT Editor Bob Annand and longtime member and former editor Ron Heuman offered a window into the history and evolution of *Tiller Topics*. What began as a simple club newsletter has, over the decades, become an enduring record of the club's life—shaped by the people who contributed to it and the circumstances in which it was produced.

Ron's involvement began in 1996, when he stepped forward to fill the role of secretary at the Annual General Meeting. As he recalls, "I agreed to take on the secretary role, and before long, the Commodore informed me that the newsletter editor position went with it." With little preparation and no formal guidance, he found himself responsible for producing a monthly publication that served as the club's primary means of communication.

In its early form, *Tiller Topics* was modest in appearance—a single sheet, folded to create four pages—but producing it required considerable effort. Gathering content was often the most challenging aspect. "The hardest part wasn't printing," Ron noted. "It was getting content. You'd be chasing people for updates right up to the last minute."

When submissions were delayed or failed to arrive, adaptability became essential. "At times, you had to rely on editorial license," he said. "If someone didn't send anything, you might step in and write it yourself to keep things moving." This pragmatic approach ensured that each issue was completed and distributed on schedule.

The production process itself was entirely manual. Newsletters were printed locally, then folded, assembled, and mailed to members. "By the time you finished one issue, it was time to begin the next." Ron recalled.

Despite these challenges, *Tiller Topics* played a vital role within the club. Prior to digital communication, it was the primary link connecting members—sharing race results, Commodore's messages, event information, and stories that reflected the character of the club. "It kept people connected," Ron observed. "That was always the purpose."

As the *Vernon Yacht Club* grew and evolved, so too did the newsletter. Changes in format, contributions from successive editors, and the eventual transition to digital distribution all marked its development over time. Yet, certain traditions endured. "There's always been something about the paper copy," Ron reflected. "People appreciated being able to pick it up and read it at the club. It made it tangible."

Today, the legacy of *Tiller Topics* is preserved in club archives, with editions dating back to the 1950s. These records provide more than a chronology of events; they capture the voices, priorities, and spirit of the membership across generations. "When you look through those old issues," Ron said, "you see what mattered to people at the time—that's the real history."

In reflecting on its significance, Ron's assessment remains clear: "It's the club's voice. However it's produced, that's what it has always been."

Tucked among old newsletters, photos, and fading documents from the *Vernon Yacht Club* sits a simple but meaningful piece of history: a 50th anniversary Cap.

For Ron, longtime contributor to *Tiller Topics*, it's more than just memorabilia—it's a reminder of a milestone year for the club. "That would've been 1953 to 2003—fifty years. We did quite a bit to mark it." Ron stated.

Today Ron donated the Cap to the club. The hat remains a small but tangible link to that celebration. Displayed in the clubhouse trophy cabinet, it represents more than fifty years—it reflects a tradition of community, volunteerism, and shared experience on and off the water.

"That's the value of keeping all that stuff. It's the story of the club." Said Ron. And like *Tiller Topics* itself, it's a reminder that the club's story is still being written.

SY GRACE O'MALLEY PART 3

VERNON YACHT CLUB'S PIRATE SHIP

Far from a sheltered bay in an Irish cove, or a Norwegian harbor, or even Kamloops, *Grace O'Malley's* new moorage was tied to a wellhead anchor dropped in near the bottom of Harbor Heights Road, one mile west of VYC. A 19th century Scottish immigrants design for piloting along Norway's rugged coastline, named after a 16th century Irish pirate queen, had found a home port. The first years featured many anxious moments sitting on the beach praying she wouldn't part ways with the mooring in this unsheltered spot. I lived across the road at that time. The other question was how to get the 43' Sitka Spruce laminated box section mast from the shoreside sawhorses to a more useful location, like on the boat. While most of the standing rigging came with the boat, right down to the turnbuckles, there were no mast tangs, spreader tips, spreader bases, mast-head crane, sail track etc. So, I did what anyone with stars in their eyes would do, order 100-year-old plans from the Herreshoff museum archives for most of the fittings you see on the mast today, and re-size the patterns to fit this mast, on the RE/MAX office photocopier. These patterns, and a 20 sq ft sheet

of 1/8 silicon bronze, a drill press...and a sawzall, taught me many lessons that year. Yes, boat stories have legs and take time to tell. When boat designs and mast fittings can be largely unchanged in over a century, yet still be used in modern construction, maybe we have time to listen.

Where there's a will...and a crane... there's a way.

Sailboats are way more comfortable with a sail up. After a couple of mastless Penticton trips in post launch summers, stepping the mast became more of a priority, OK an obsession. Finally, after much midnite oil, and alottalotta drill pressing we stepped the mast at the marina and

phoned to raise the bridge. Now, to unpack 25-year-old "new in bag" sails. Seven custom made sails from International Sailmakers in Hong Kong came with the boat. Other than the new larger staysail bought recently these sails are still in regular use over 50 years from new. Stay tuned for **part four**, actual sailing stories. Our FB group is *Sailing Adventures in Grace O'Malley* if you want to join.

CRANE DAY SUCCESS!

Crane Day always seems to come too early! This year it arrived after a week of less than 10 degree C, blustery weather making it a real challenge for last minute work on boats involving fiberglass, epoxy, or paint. But on April 17th as usual, sailors found a way to get their boats watertight before splash down.

Speaking of big splashes, what made this year's crane-day special was the 200,000 ton crane that was on site. We saw a behemoth of an Alpha Crane come in to lift 23,000 lb Grace O'Malley back into the water. Lower water levels meant a bigger crane was needed to ensure Grace landed in deep water (*see the Grace O'Malley saga part III in this issue*). So, while Captain Dan was on the hook for the difference in crane cost, the bigger machine actually made it easier for the crane to lift and drop all boats well clear of the ever-increasing sediment and muck. So, skippers, feel free to buy Dan a beer the next time you see him in the Gangplank.

A huge thank you to Mike Lowther for once again organizing a smooth and efficient crane-in operation. Shout-out to our big powerboat members in the yard—it took coordination between sail and power people to make room for the crane, and everyone pulled together. 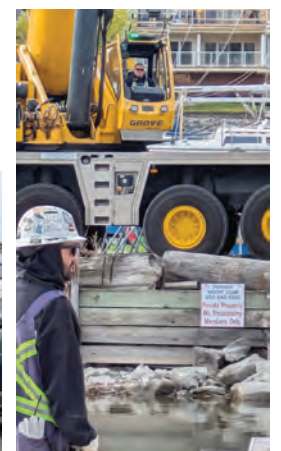

LIFEBOAT SOS

A NEW SERVICE AIMS TO MAKE BOATING ON LOCAL LAKES SAFER

Tiller Topics Editor Bob Annand sat down with Vernon Parkhurst to discuss a new service his company designed to improve safety and communication on Okanagan Lake. The new mobile app is launching in early May and its looking to make boating on Okanagan Lake safer by connecting people on the water in real time.

Developed by local entrepreneurs Vernon Parkhurst, Joe Poirier and Talli Ward, *Lifeboat SOS* is designed as a lake-based safety network—something Parkhurst says has long been missing from inland waterways. “Okanagan Lake is incredibly busy, but it’s also vast,” Parkhurst explained. “You can be surrounded by people and still not be seen, especially if you’re on a paddleboard or kayak.”

The app allows users to send out alerts to others nearby, ranging from general hazards—such as debris or shallow areas—to more urgent situations like mechanical breakdowns, low fuel, or medical issues. In more serious emergencies, including fires, storms, or a man overboard, users can broadcast higher-level alerts with details about their situation.

Nearby users can then see how far away they are from the person in distress, estimate response time, and decide if they’re able to assist. Built-in GPS navigation and messaging features help responders locate those in need quickly.

Parkhurst said the goal is to reduce response times and offer practical help in situations where official rescue services may be limited. “There are times when you’re stranded but not technically in an emergency,” he said. “This gives people a way to connect directly with someone nearby who has the equipment to help.”

In addition to its alert system, *Lifeboat SOS* includes GPS navigation, trip sharing, and an anchor alert that notifies users if their boat begins to drift. A “chatter” feature—similar to a CB or VHF radio—allows users to communicate with others on the water in real time through public or private channels.

Future updates may include live camera feeds from around the lake, giving users the ability to check weather and water conditions before heading out. All safety-related features will be free to use, with optional premium features planned for later development.

The app is set to launch May 2 at the *Vernon Boat Show* on Okanagan Lake, where developers hope to attract an initial user base of around 10,000 people. Local business partnerships are also in the works, offering deals and discounts through the platform.

Looking ahead, Parkhurst envisions expanding the service to other lakes across British Columbia and Alberta, and eventually to coastal regions. A future paid assistance model—similar to ride-sharing services—could also allow experienced boaters to respond to transport requests.

For now, the focus remains on building a strong local network. “Boaters already believe in helping each other,” Parkhurst said. “This just makes it faster, easier, and more effective.”

DECK RENEWAL

COMPLETED AHEAD OF BUSY SEASON

A major deck refurbishment project has wrapped up just in time for upcoming events, delivering both structural improvements and a refreshed look.

VYC Maintenance Manager Ryan, who oversaw the work, highlighted the efficiency of the project timeline. “We started ripping up the vinyl on a Monday, and we had railings up and vinyl installed by Friday,” he said. “Less than five days to get all that done.”

The upgrade included installing newly welded railings designed without floor drilling, improving durability and preventing future issues. “It’s stronger, and it won’t cause rot,” Ryan explained. “That was the goal—make it reliable.”

During construction, the team uncovered hidden structural damage. “There was some rot in sections of the deck, especially around the corners,” Ryan noted. “We cut out the old plywood and joists and replaced all of that.”

Additional sealing work was completed to prevent water intrusion going forward.

Despite these unexpected repairs, the project stayed close to its original budget of approximately \$50,000.

The team also ensured minimal disruption to scheduled activities. “They even brought in two other companies to make sure we only missed one steak night, not two,” Ryan said.

While most of the structure is now fully restored, a few elements—such as a rebuilt pillar—are considered temporary fixes. “It’s good enough for a couple of seasons,” Ryan added, “and then we’ll reassess.”

With new deck furniture arriving and further enhancements under consideration, the space is now safe, functional, and ready for members to enjoy dinner and a drink while overlooking Okanagan Lake.

Thanks go to Maintenance Manager Ryan for overseeing a successful project.
